



## Cavs may have King James but don't count the Hawks out of this series

The fact that the Atlanta Hawks made it to the second round of the playoffs is no surprise here. This is a franchise slowly becoming one of the best in the NBA. The biggest positive coming out of the Miami series was that the Hawks finally learned how to win a meaningful game on the road. Remember, sometimes you have to take baby steps.

What does surprise me is the fact that no one gives the Hawks any chance to beat LeBron James and the Cleveland Cavaliers. Former Georgia Tech star Jon Barry, now working for ESPN, has been very critical of the Hawks and their chances against the Cavs, for the most part saying that Cleveland will win easily in four. Of course, Barry is known for being wrong more than right.

Look, the Hawks go into the series, which started Tuesday night (This edition of Score went to print earlier Tuesday), as sizeable underdogs to a team seeded No. 1 overall in the NBA, one that finished the season 66-16 with an amazing 39-2 record at home. But, remember, the Hawks were given no chance to beat Boston last year in the playoffs; all the experts cried for a sweep yet Atlanta took what are now the defending world champions to seven games. Anything, in other words, can happen.

Also, for me, the Hawks are playing with house money, taking an incredible step forward this season by winning 47 games in the regular season and taking out the Heat in the opening round, earning the team's first trip to the conference semifinals since 1999.

The Hawks, much like in the Boston one last year, have nothing to lose in this series, while all the pressure in the world is on the Cavs. The Hawks can play loose while head coach Mike Woodson has the luxury of trying some different things to see if there is any way the team can contain the mighty LeBron James. Interestingly, the Hawks faced the Cavs four times during the regular season and, while they lost three of those games, every matchup but the first one (110-96 loss at Cleveland) was close.

While I'm not going to predict an upset here, as I think Cleveland will eventually prevail, I do feel the Hawks will put a scare into the Cavs and take two. I also hope that, regardless of what happens, the Hawks take care of two matters in the offseason: extend the contract of coach Woodson and resign veteran point guard Mike Bibby. The team is now a big man away from really putting itself in a position to win it all. According to Score NBA expert Scott Janovitz, they should use the summer to go after 7-footer Marcin Gortat, who will be a free agent and is now playing behind Dwight Howard in Orlando. Because of Howard, Gortat doesn't get all the minutes he deserves, but many feel he is a future star in the NBA, especially on the defensive side of the ball.

How quickly fortunes are changing here in sports, as it has been years since this town has been this excited about the Falcons. 

## **YANKS PITCHING** FLAILING

The Yankees are off to a less-thanstellar start this season, and the new Yankee Stadium has not been kind to its tenants. They claim it more or less has the same dimensions as the old stadium, so everyone wants to know why on earth balls are flying out of the park at a record pace. They've even gone so far as to contact a meteorologist to try to find an explana-

tion. I'm only guessing, but awful pitching is probably a big factor.

p emaining consistent with their always-Rgiving ways and as part of the National Football League Grassroots Program, the Atlanta Falcons announced last week plans to donate a \$100,000 field development grant to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Hall County. The grant, officially awarded by the Falcons, the NFL Youth Football Fund and Local Initiatives Support Corporation, is only part of the \$2.5 million that has been spent this year on building and refurbishing playing fields in NFL communities. The Boys & Girls Clubs of Hall County will use the grant to build a new natural-grass football field at the Joseph Walters Boys & Girls Club in Gainesville. The field, scheduled to open this summer, will be used by more than 2,500 youths each year and will be an Atlanta Falcons Fitness Zone site.

Patrick Schuster's amazing run finally came to an end last Tuesday. Schuster, a pitching ace for Mitchell High School in Clearwater. Flo. had the provider of the school in the school i Clearwater, Fla, had thrown four straight no-hitters heading into his team's district tournament last Tuesday. Schuster's bid at a fifth no-no in a row was denied when the talented senior gave up a single in the third. Though he came up two shy of the national record of six consecutive no-hit games, Shuster's four in a row was good enough to set a Florida state record. He has plans to attend the University of Florida next year, but could be drafted as early as the second round.

SI.com's Andrew Perloff used last week to come out with his "way-early" 2010 NFL mock draft and, as far as the football in this state is concerned, the results were somewhat surprising. After Georgia had two players selected in the first round of this year's draft, according to Perloff, don't expect a Dawg to go in the top 32 in 2010. Tech, on the other hand, will almost certainly provide the draft with some first-round talent, as physical running back Jonathan Dwyer is sure to be off the board early on day one; in Perloff's opinion, the talented Yellow Jacket will be taken 19th overall by the New Orleans Saints. Oklahoma quarterback Sam Bradford was slotted for first overall on the list with Tennessee's Eric Berry going at two, Oklahoma defensive tackle Gerald McCoy at three, Russell Okung of Oklahoma State going four and USC safety Taylor Mays taken fifth overall.

**NEW RIVALRY** ...


A new in-state football rivalry may be joining the Georgia-Georgia Tech feud of old, as Tech has agreed to play Georgia Southern on the gridiron in 2015. When current Yellow Jacket head coach Paul Johnson hosts his former team, it will serve as the first time the two schools have ever met. Johnson coached the Eagles for five years and won I-AA national championships in 1999 and 2000. He was also an assistant there for four years. While Tech has never played Southern in football, Georgia has played the Eagles on four occasions and as recently as last season.

ing with the US Junior Team at the 2008 Bank of Scotland Cup held in Grangemouth, Scotland, which he believes has greatly impacted his performance this season.

As the season winds down, the Miller Grove coaching staff is busy getting its team ready for state. With the school already enjoying an impressive athletic year, highlighted by top-tier football talent and a boys basketball state championship, the staff knows that it has the potential to bring home the top prize in boys Class 4A track; much of those chances for success hinge on the performance of for success hinge on the performance of Gilstrap. And it is a role that he is more than willing to accept, according to Dillard. "What drives Kenneth is he not only wants to win as

drives Kenneth is he not only wants to win as an individual, but [he wants to help Miller Grove] win together as a team," he said.

If you have not yet seen Gilstrap run in high school, there's still time. The 2009 state championships will be held May 7-9 in Jefferson. It marks an opportunity to see one of the top performers in Georgia high school athletics this year.

## Class 5A boys state soccer semifinals feature 2008 title-game rematch

Here is Score Atlanta's preview of all boys semifinal soccer matches.

## **CLASS 5A ...**

Walton vs. Collins Hill: It will be a rematch of last year's Class 5A state championship game when Walton and Collins Hill square off in a blockbuster semifinal clash. Walton prevailed in the 2008 championship showdown, but top-ranked Collins Hill is poised for revenge this time around. The Eagles, Region 7 champions, rolled over Greenbrier in last Saturday's quarterfinals and are welcoming the return of Furman signee Nicky MacKain for the semifinals. MacKain missed the past two games due to a red card in an opening-round win over Dacula.

Centennial vs. East Coweta: Walton is the only team remaining in 5A that did not win its respective region crown, as Region 6 champion Centennial and Region 4 victor East Coweta will do battle in the other semifinal. East Coweta won a second-round thriller over Coffee 4-3 on penalty kicks, breaking a 0-0 tie after regulation and overtime. The Indians then managed to scrape past South Forsyth 4-3 in the quarterfinals. They will have to go on the road for the first time in the playoffs to take on Centennial, which has looked impressive in victories over South Cobb, Peachtree Ridge and Warner Robins.

## CLASS 4A.

**McIntosh vs. Hillgrove:** If powerhouse McIntosh needed a wakeup call to get focused for the semifinals, it got one. The Chiefs are nationally-ranked and have won three state

championships since coach Bunky Colvin took over in 2000. Colvin and company are still alive for a fourth, but just barely. After dispatching Tucker 3-1 in the first round of the state playoffs, McIntosh clipped Apalachee 3-2 and needed overtime to beat Hardaway 2-1. McIntosh will take on a surprising Hillgrove squad for a spot in the title game. After finishing third in Region 7-AAAA, Hillgrove has won three straight road games—over Heritage-Rockdale, Chamblee and Evans—to reach the final four.

Marist vs. Lakeside-DeKalb: It will be a spirited clash between Region 6 foes when Marist takes on Lakeside-DeKalb. Marist has not allowed a single goal in the state playoffs after losing to Chamblee in the region final. The War Eagles beat Alexander 2-0, edged Habersham Central 1-0, and dominated Lakeside-Evans 4-0. Lakeside-DeKalb has surrendered one goal in each of its three games en route to the semifinals, but a high-powered Viking attack has poured in 10 of its own.

## CLASS 3A

Carrollton vs. St. Pius X: Carrollton captured the Region 6-AAA title and has not looked back. The Trojans have been dominant through three state playoff games, ousting Riverwood 5-2, Gainesville 3-0, and Richmond Hill 4-0. Carrollton scored all four of its goals against Richmond Hill prior to halftime and most of the team's starters did not even see the field throughout the second 40 minutes. St. Pius, however, could provide the Trojans with their toughest test yet. Champions of Region 5, Pius advances to the final four with wins over Cartersville.

Creekview and Region 4 winner Woodward Academy

Oconee vs. West Hall: All four semifinalists in 3A are region champions, as Region 6 representative Oconee County and Region 7 titlist West Hall will square off for the other spot in the title game. Both Oconee and West Hall advanced past the semifinals with 2-0 victories. That was the third consecutive shutout for West Hall, which had previously rolled over Franklin County 6-0 and Cedartown 4-0. Oconee escaped its first two rounds with 1-0 nail-biters over both Johnson-Gainesville and Southeast Whitfield.

## CLASS A/AA .

Blessed Trinity vs. Westminster: Blessed Trinity will be looking to take out a region champion for the third time in these state playoffs when it travels to face rival Westminster. After blanking a pair of region champs (Union County and Coosa) 1-0, Blessed Trinity edged Savannah Country Day 2-1 in a memorable quarterfinal clash. Seth Stratton scored the game-winner from 30 yards out with a mere 1.2 seconds remaining in double ove-rtime. Westminster survived a 2-1 affair in the second round against Pacelli, but that was preceded by a 3-0 win over Our Lady of Mercy and followed by a quarterfinal 2-0 road shutout of Athens Academy.

## Forsyth baseball enjoying historic year, will look to cap season with playoff success

When the baseball season began back in February, all the focus in Class 5A was on Brookwood and whether they would repeat. Midway through the year, all the talk was about Roswell, the Hornets' red-hot start and national ranking. At the conclusion of the regular season, however, South Forsyth sat at 22-4 and was ranked No. 1 (Gasports.com) going into the playoffs. It would seem that the War Eagles came out of nowhere, but they were steady all year long and will be making their third straight playoff appearance.

In his fourth season as head coach of the team, Jamie Corr has put South Forsyth baseball on the map and in a position that it's never been before, as the 22 wins this season are a school record. For the first time in school history the team has made the playoffs three straight years. Despite South Forsyth's unprecedented

Even before the season started, something special was happening with this program. Six seniors had already signed to play college baseball before they played their first game this year. This seemed to set the stage for a magical run. In the region opener against Peachtree Ridge, Zach Alvord hit a tremendous blast estimated

at 470 feet. Chris Rowley provided the team with a complete-game shutout, allowing just six hits in the 10-0 victory.

One of the most memorable games was at Turner Field against Mill Creek in the first-ever high school baseball game at that site. Although they were narrowly defeated 4-3, the War Eagles were owners of the game's most exciting moment when Andrew Barna hit a 385-foot shot into the first row of the seats in left-centerfield. That loss was one of only four on the season and all four were by only one run. In the region championship-clinching game, the War Eagles blew out North Gwinnett 11-3. Every batter in the lineup had a hit, including home runs from Alvord and Chase Fowler and a grand slam by Jordan Neese. The seniors were definitely the leaders of the team, but they

also got help from the underclassmen.

"We had great contributions all year long from everyone up and down the lineup," Corr said. "They always gave 100 percent effort and were 100 percent focused."

With the regular season now over, how is South Forsyth going to turn the success they've had all year into a state championship?

"First thing is you have to be good, second thing is you have to be lucky," said Corr. "We've prepared real hard to try to become a good ball club all season, now we just have to go out there and do what we've prepared to do."

The state tournament for South Forsyth starts this Friday against Grayson in a best-of-three series.

## Georgia high school products are hot commodities once again in NFL Draft

Atotal of 13 former Georgia high school graduates were selected in the 2009 NFL Draft this past weekend, including one player, William Middleton of Furman, who will be returning home. Middleton, who was selected with the second pick of the fifth round by Atlanta, played at the Marist School for head coach Alan Chadwick.

'He's certainly one of the hardest-working kids we have ever had," Chadwick said of Middleton. "He was always the first one on the practice field and stayed late to work on techniques, particularly defensive back techniques. It's easy to see with his work ethic how he got to this point."

Troy's Sherrod Martin, by way of Griffin High School, was the first Georgia high school alum chosen and the only one picked on Day 1. The 6-foot-1, 197-pound safety was the 27th pick of the second round, going 59th overall to Carolina. Former Tucker High School and University of Georgia cornerback Asher Allen was scooped up next, going to Minnesota in Round 3. Also going in the third round was one of Allen's SEC rivals, Jared Cook, and his Georgia teammate Corvey Irvin. Cook prepped at North Gwinnett before becoming a top-flight tight end at South Carolina, and is now on his way to the Tennessee Titans. Irvin, a defensive tackle on his way to Carolina, is a product of Laney in Augusta.

## THE REST OF THE CROP ...

In the fourth round, Tampa Bay chose former Southern Cal and Houston County defensive end Kyle Moore, while Tennessee took former Southern Mississippi and McEachern linebacker Gerald McRath. Jimmy Dorsey was the head coach at McEachern during McRath's time with the Indians and remembers his intangibles.

"The most unique thing about Gerald is that in just a short period of time he won over his teammates and coaches and just became an instant leader within our football program," Dorsey said. "He's one of the most well-rounded, mature, conscientious players that I ever coached.'

Joining Middleton as fifth-round selections were former South Carolina and South Cobb High School wide receiver Kenny McKinley, who is headed to Denver, and former South Carolina and Thomson High School linebacker Jasper Brinkley, who is headed to Minnesota, and former Oklahoma guard and Washington High School lineman Duke Robinson, who is on his way to Carolina. Robinson's head coach at Washington, Rodney Cofield, said his first impression of the then-6-3, 300-plus pounder was that he was "impressive looking", but needed to mature.

"He came here with that aggressive behavior, very young, immature, was not focused," Cofield said. "We pulled him to the side and let him know that he's not going to be straddling the fence, he either was going to be the man or not play at all. He made that choice that he was going to be the man and the rest is history."

Former Georgia Tech Yellow Jacket Andrew Gardner and for-mer Georgia Bulldog Jarius Wynn led off the Georgia high school products that were drafted in the sixth round. Gardner, an offensive tackle headed to Miami, attended Sandy Creek High School. Wynn, a defensive end picked by Green Bay, played at Lincoln County High School. Also going off the board in the sixth round was former Clemson and Douglass High School running back James Davis, who was the final Georgia high school product taken in the draft.

## BEATING THE ODDS ...

Georgia draftees had to overcome obstacles to obtain success. For Middleton, college recruiters' biggest concern was his lack of size.

"He was not a real big physical-type kid, but he was kind of wiry and bodystrong," Chadwick said. "The question was how much bigger and stronger would he get."

College recruiters also had questions about McRath's size, but another concern stemmed from a dislocated shoulder he suffered as a senior.

"He made it through the year, but it was very difficult," Dorsey said. "He would miss parts of games because it would slide out of place. Southern Miss didn't care. They saw

enough his junior year and sparkles of what he was his senior year."

Robinson, Middleton and McRath answered the questions surrounding them, giving the State of Georgia a new class of NFL players. According to USA Football, Georgia was fifth nationally with 83 players on NFL rosters at the start of the 2008 season. Atlanta was tied for fourth among cities with 12 players.

# 'The campaign we have going on right now, "The Hunt Is On," I think is true'

Longtime Atlanta sportswriter and Score Atlanta publisher I.J. Rosenberg spoke with Atlanta Falcons owner Arthur Blank. The subjects ranged from quarterback Matt Ryan to a new stadium. Here is what Blank had to say on the state of the franchise ...

I.J. Rosenberg: It's amazing to see where this franchise is compared to this time last year when it had hired a new general manager and head coach.

Arthur Blank: Well, I had great confidence in the selections we made for our general manager and head coach, and obviously as soon as they worked together during free agency and the draft, we saw the quality of their decision making and then I saw what was happening with our OTAs (Organized Team Activities) and I really felt more confident about the team than I did prior to that. Did I think we would end up 11-5 and in the playoffs? I can't say I knew that was in the bag, but I certainly thought this team would be more competitive than most people thought.

New GM Thomas Dimitroff now has a year under his belt. His draft class last season and free agent acquisitions made big contributions to the 11-5 record and playoff appearance. How has Thomas been so successful in such a short period of time, especially considering his youth and the fact that he had no GM experience?

Arthur: I think the fact that he had no GM experience was not an issue. You have to remember, his dad was a scout in the NFL for a long time. Talent evaluations were discussed regularly in his home and he spent over 20 years on the road as a talent evaluator himself and came out of a great organization, New England, where he had been for six years and spent the last five as director of college scouting. So I had great confidence in his intellect and his creative thinking and all things relating to his character and integrity. So I'm not shocked he has been as successful as he's been.

# Coach Mike Smith has also made a major impact. Your feeling on Smith's first season as an NFL head coach?

Arthur: The fact that he was named Coach of the Year was exceptional. He had a wonderful first year. He did a great job bonding with the players and developing a wonderful coaching staff. It's not just about the head coach, it's about the coordinators and the position coaches and Coach Smith has reached out to every other tentacle in this organization, whether it be finance, or marketing, or ticketing, or sales. In any area he could be supportive, as well as being active in the community, he's done it all in his first year. So he's had a wonderful first year and getting Coach of the Year was certainly a recognition he deserved.

After going from four wins to 11 in one season behind rookie quarterback Matt Ryan, many around the league feel the Falcons are ready to take the next step and become one of the league's top franchises. How close do you feel this team is to giving this city the consistently winning team Atlanta has always hoped for?

Arthur: I think we have to do two things at the same time: we have to focus on the immediacy of the current situation—that is the game of the week or the current season—but we also have to continue to build the roster and the team for the future at the same time. But I think Thomas and Mike both have the unique perspective and ability to do that.

I've seen many decisions they've made over the last 12 months that were not only the right decisions for the team at the current time, but they will feed into building the right kind of roster for us in the future. I'm all about creating and sustaining a winning organization for a long period of time as opposed to just a one-year wonder deal and that's the avenue that the organization is moving towards.

A lot has been written and said about your young quarterback Matt Ryan. Is it fair to say he is going to be one of the greats in this league some day?

Your team will face one of the toughest schedules in the league, playing non-division games against clubs from the AFC East and NFC East. Can your team match last year's win total or even better it playing teams like the Patriots and Giants?

Arthur: It is a very tough schedule. Based on wins and losses from 2008, we have the fourth most difficult schedule in the NFL. Having said that, that's all about last year and we're about this year. I think it's going to be better. We have a lot of young players who now have had a year of on-the-job experience and we will continue to build the roster through the draft. Also, our coaches will have


be an opportunity for the fans to see all those things and really appreciate them. We will also definitely have some new and exciting stuff for fans to see.

There continues to be talk of the Falcons building a new stadium. Where are you on this possibility?

Arthur: We have a great partnership with the Georgia World Congress Center and will continue to do so. By the year 2015, '16, or '17, when our bonds are paid off, we will have an option to move to a different site and our stadium will be close to 25 years old. While we've put a lot of money into the Dome, about 50 million dollars in the last three years, eventually, in order to have the best environment for our fans and for us financially, we will need a new stadium. So we will be looking at sites downtown and at some other sites in the greater Atlanta area as well.

The economy has wreaked havoc on professional sports in general, even having an effect on the NFL, considered the strongest financially of all the sports. How are you handling this with your franchise and how will you continue to make it affordable for fans to come to Falcons games?


Arthur: We made a tremendous commitment in 2008 to try and hold the line on ticket pricing. In 2009, 69 percent of our tickets were either held flat or went down as well; we increased about 30 percent of our tickets. So we're very sensitive to the economy, from both our fans' perspective and our sponsors' perspective. We try to give both as many options as possible and we try to maintain our prices as well as we can; we are well below the league average in terms of all the seating components.



Arthur: I'm very encouraged; we are one of the top teams in the NFL in ticket renewals and probably second or third in the league in terms of new ticket sales and all that is a tribute to Atlanta. Having said that, we have a lot of tickets available still, at all price ranges, and I would encourage any of our fans to come out and support the team and take advantage of opportunities that will not always be there in the future.

You have always been one that has worn his heart on his sleeve. A year ago you talked about the 2007 season and said it was one of the most difficult experiences in your life. But you and the Falcons appear to have taken that experience, grown from it and have a city buzzing about their professional football team. How excited are you about the 2009 season and what's ahead for this franchise? **Arthur:** I cannot be more excited than I am. I'm excited because I've seen the qualthe quality of the leadership, particularly with our general manager and our head coach, and a lot of our great play came from young players that are only going to get better over time. So, I look at that and I see the preparation and the thought process that went into the draft and the opportunipick up piaye will make us better; I'm very excited about that. But having said that, that's all on paper. We have to go out and play the games and win the games. The campaign we have going on right now, "The Hunt Is On," I think is true. The hunt is on for us and our competitors, and on the field on Sundays the hunt is certainly on. We under-stand that given today's economy and today's reality, we have to work harder than we've ever worked before.

## Addition of Gonzalez gives Falcons future Hall of Famer and veteran presence

With Pro Bowlers at running back and wide receiver last season, and a rising star at quarterback, the Atlanta Falcons established themselves as one of the top offenses in the NFL last season. Now after filling one of their few offensive holes with a pass-catching tight end in future Hall of Famer Tony Gonzalez, they will only get better. General manager Thomas Dimitroff signed off on a deal last week with the Chiefs, trading a 2010 second-round draft pick to the Kansas City Chiefs for Gonzalez, one of the best to ever play his position.

"His credentials are incredibly strong," said Falcons Owner and CEO Arthur Blank last Friday at a press conference at the Blank Family Office. "Most folks would describe Tony as the league's most accomplished player at the tight end position."

Gonzalez's reputation certainly lives up to the praises of Blank, Dimitroff and Head Coach Mike Smith, who all echoed similar compliments when Gonzalez was introduced to the media.

"Tony is, for us, the type of guy on and off the field that we want to continue to bring the program around," Dimitroff said. "When we drafted Matt Ryan last year we talked about providing him with tools and instruments to make this offense continue to jell and evolve."

## ALREADY A LEGEND ...

The Cal-Berkeley alum has appeared in the Pro Bowl 10 consecutive times in his 12 seasons in the NFL. He also may end up going down as the best tight end in the history of the game. Gonzalez ranks first on the all-time list at the position in receptions (916), receiving yards (10,940) and 100-yard

receiving games.

But the Huntington Beach, Cal., native made it clear that stats aren't why he wanted to be in a Falcons uniform this fall.

'I'm here for one reason, that's to win a Super Bowl," Gonzalez said soon after taking the podium.

Now Gonzalez joins wide receiver Roddy White, NFL Rookie of the Year quarterback Matt Ryan, and running back Michael Turner to form the core of what could be a truly prolific Falcons offense.

'You double-team somebody or you stack the box and somebody is going to get open," Gonzalez said. "Do I think I'll get 100 balls? I don't have to. I've been fortunate to have such a good career it's not about going out there and breaking records. This is about going in and moving those chains."

The Gonzalez signing also could help plug a few of the offense's weaknesses and will especially help Atlanta's red zone offense. Gonzalez is known for getting into the end zone. He caught 10 touchdown passes last season, and has caught 76 for his career, another category in which he ranks first all-time at his position.

The move means that Justin Peelle, who caught three touchdown passes last season, should join Ben Hartsock in a backup role, with both getting most of their time on running downs. Peelle also could be used in the red zone, an area where he made several important scoring grabs last year.

While he will improve the passing game greatly, the trade should also pay dividends in the run game. Gonzalez has been one of the best run-blocking tight ends in the league, paving the way for running backs such as Priest Holmes and Larry Johnson.

The Falcons also felt that Gonzalez's leadership ability and intangibles were essential in pulling the trigger on last week's deal with the Chiefs.

"Everyone realizes that we need to continue to bring in veteran leadership," Dimitroff said. "It's something that we feel strongly about, knowing that we are a younger team, and we need to continue to sort of sprinkle in the free-agent acquisitions that have that presence, and obviously Tony has that."

## LOOKING FORWARD TO

The Falcons are getting a great player in Gonzalez, and one that just might have what it takes to get Atlanta into the Super Bowl for the second time in franchise history. Gonzalez is already excited about preparing for what the Falcons are hoping is a great season this fall.

"This is an unbelievable opportunity," Gonzalez said. "To be able to play with the guys out here, guys like Matt Ryan, Roddy White, Turner in the backfield, wide receiver Michael Jenkins, the list goes on and on.

'This is going to be something special. I'm really looking forward to being a part of this.'

One notable first-round matchup in Class 5A features Region 7 and current state No. 1 (Gasports.com) South Forsyth and Grayson, a team that has been a tough out in the playoffs in recent years and has experience in the postseason; the Rams finished 18-8 for the regular season to earn the No. 4 seed out of Region 8. Region 6 winner and Class 5A state No. 2 Pope will face Woodstock, the Region 5 No. 4, in a first-round pairing. ... Conspicuously absent from the playoffs this year is 2008 runner-up and 2007 champion Walton, which finished with a 7-11 record in a much-improved Region 6.

The Bulldogs received some good news last week when South Carolina defensive end Dexter Morant announced that Georgia is among his three favorite schools. "I want to commit before my season starts," Morant recently told ESPN's J.C. Shurburtt. "I will probably wait until August, but it just depends on when I see one that I really like and if it's where I really want to be. I have a top three right now, and really, it is Georgia, Florida and Alabama."

According to the 6-foot-7, 235-pound prospect, the differences between his top schools are negligible. "Right now there is nothing that really separates them. I like about the same thing from each one of them," he said. "They all have great campuses and great academic areas and graduation rates. Also, they all have good football teams so I could go there and be seen."

According to Ambles, Southern California is making the strongest push for his services while the University of Florida is a close second.

Another offensive standout at the combine was Flowery Branch quarterback Connor Shaw. Shaw, who is committed to South Carolina and is the younger brother of Georgia Tech quarterback Jaybo Shaw, displayed exceptional athleticism on the day as well as the throwing mechanics and accuracy to stay at the quarterback position at the college level.

On the defensive side of the ball, Newnan safety Alec Ogletree, who is ranked 31st nationally according to Rivals.com, stood out the most, going head-to-head with Ambles on numerous occasions and holding his own. In one-on-ones, Ogletree had no problem running step-for-step with every wideout thrown his way, displaying excellent speed and coverage ability.

Ogletree, however, may not have been the best player on the defensive side of the ball, as 2011 recruit and South Lake High School (Fla.) defensive back Nick Waisome might have been the star of the day.

"[Ambles] got me good once," Waisome said. "But then I jammed him pretty good the next time. It gives me great experience to go up against a receiver like that. It gets me even better to see what it's like to go against players that are going to the next level."

## Hawks outlast Heat in seven-game series

On Sunday, the Hawks ousted the Miami Heat from the playoffs, won their first postseason series since 1999 and captured their first seven-game series win in 39 years. Though inconsistent and unpredictable at times, when Atlanta beat the Heat it did so with stifling defense and high-octane, fast-paced offense. That the Hawks excel in transition, rather than in half-court sets, is a team trait that was only further reinforced in round 1one. A new discovery for the Hawks that was unearthed, however, was some extra depth along the bench, as both Mario West and Solomon Jones made noticeable contributions in Atlanta's first-round win. But, most importantly, we learned that Joe Johnson can lead his team to postseason victory, as the Hawks' shooting guard finished with a team-high 27 points in the seriesclinching Game 7 win, going 10-of-19 from the floor and hitting 6-of-8 shots from beyond the are. beyond the arc.

"He's the foundation of our team," Hawks head coach Mike Woodson said of Johnson, a three-time All-Star. "We've built around Joe Johnson, and here he is in his fourth year now, going into the second round of the playoffs, and that speaks volumes for Joe Johnson."

Yet while Johnson might have been the hero of Game 7 (if there was one; remember, Atlanta did win the game by 13 points), Josh Smith was probably the most emotional Hawk after it.

"These are the days you live for," the fifth-year forward said. "To see where we've come from to where we are now is crazy. And this isn't some Cinderella story. We've worked for every bit of this. We earned the

right to be here. And now we're moving on to the next round.

Smith had 21 points and nine rebounds in Atlanta's 91-78 win. For the seven-game series, J-Smoove averaged 16.3 points to go along with 8.9 rebounds and recorded double-doubles in two of the seven games against the Heat.

However, every bit as notable as Johnson's Game 7 performance and Smith's post-game confessional was the fine series Zaza Pachulia put together. In the first round, the sixth-year center out of the Republic of Georgia averaged 7.6 points and 7.1 rebounds in just 23 minutes of action and recorded 12 points and an amazing 18 rebounds in a decisive Game 4 road victory. And, aside from the box scores, Z-Pac's heart and hustle no doubt played a significant role in Atlanta's seven-game defeat of Dwyane Wade and the Heat.

# Thrashers faring well in international play

The season may be over for the Atlanta Thrashers, but that hasn't kept many of the team's stars from getting in some action on the ice over the last few weeks. Nine Thrashers have traveled across the pond to take part in the 2009 IHF Hockey World Championships in Switzerland.

The largest contingency of Thrashers is with Team USA, where Zach Bogosian, Ron Hainsey and Colin Stuart are attempting to push the States past reigning champion Russia. Speaking of Russia, the team also has multiple Thrashers, as Ilya Kovalchuk and Ilya Nikulin have each returned to defend their country's championship. Canada, Sweden, Finland and Slovakia each have one representative from Atlanta, as Colby Armstrong, Tobias Enstrom, Ansi Salmela and Boris Valabik have returned home to play for their respective countries.

For fans of the Thrashers, the news has been mostly good; all six teams with a Thrasher on the roster are still in contention for the gold medal. However, one Thrasher won't be affecting his team's chances of taking the big prize. Tobias Enstrom left Sweden's second game of the preliminary round after suffering an injury to the face after being slammed into the boards by Martins Karsums. There has been no word on the severity of the injury or when he could possibly return for Team Sweden.

Leading the tournament so far have been Russia and Canada, which is not a surprise to hockey enthusiasts. The two have combined for zero losses as the tournament moves to the qualifving round. Kovalchuk has led the Russians to their perfect record, leading the team in points and goals scored. Kovy has scored three goals with six assists, putting him in second place in overall scoring for the tournament.

The most surprising team so far in the tournament has been the United States. Now the Thrashers and the other elimi-

Defensive tackle Peria Jerry of Ole Miss was the first-round pick for the Birds, giving Atlanta a much-needed big body to fill the void at the position after Grady Jackson was not re-signed this offseason.

Atlanta took safety William Moore in

the second round. Moore was rated as a firstrounder after his junior season before suffering through an injury-riddled season in 2008.

An extremely versatile player, Moore can play the strong or free safety position.

The rest of the picks were cornerback Chris Owens of San Jose Sate, former Richmond Spider defensive end Lawrence Sidhury Atlanta patige and Furmen corner. Sidbury, Atlanta native and Furman cornerback William Middleton, gigantic offensive tackle Garrett Reynolds of North Carolina, linebacker Spencer Adkins from Miami, and Georgia Tech defensive tackle Vance Walker.

The Falcons did plenty of work outside of the draft as well. They signed University of Georgia grad Verron Haynes for the

Once thought of as too undersized to make it in the NFL at just 5-9, Haynes proved the doubters wrong, playing six seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers and picking up two Super Bowl rings in the process. He carried the ball 174 times for 738 yards and three touchdowns as a Steeler. Haynes is also a threat to catch the ball out of the backfield, as he tallied 58 receptions for 429 yards and two touchdowns in Pittsburgh.





## **Baseball looks to recover; Fox signs player**

A fter getting off to a 31-7 start (12-2 in SEC play) and being ranked the No. 1 baseball team in the country as late as the fourth week in April, Georgia all of a sudden hit the skids. The Bulldogs lost seven of their next nine The Bulldogs lost seven of their next nine games, including five in a row, after dropping their first two games of a three-game home series with Florida. If Georgia does not rebound from its recent defeats, the team is in danger of earning a less-than-favorable seed for the SEC Tournament. Florida took a one-game lead over Georgia atop the SEC East standings by virtue of winning the first two games of the series, putting Georgia at risk of not getting a top-two seed in the May 20-24 tournament. LSU, Arkansas, Ole Miss and Alabama all have their eyes on a Western Division Championship and the other top two seeds.

The Bulldogs' saving grace, however, may be their league schedule after the Florida series. Georgia has a three-game home series with Vanderbilt starting Friday and ends its regular season with a three-game series at South Carolina. Both the Commodores and Gamecocks had losing conference records as of last weekend and will likely be the last two teams to qualify for the eight-team SEC Tournament. The Bulldogs' annual matchup with Georgia Tech in the Spring Baseball Classic at Turner Field is sandwiched between those two series, as it is scheduled for Tuesday. Tech won the teams' only other meeting this season.

SIGN OF THE TIMES ...

The April NFL Draft saw former Bulldogs Matthew Stafford (Detroit), Knowshon Moreno (Denver), Mohamed Massaquoi (Cleveland), Asher Allen (Minnesota), Corvey Irvin (Carolina) and Jarius Wynn (Green Bay) selected in the first six rounds. And after the draft was complete,

several more ex-Georgia players signed free agent contracts. Safety CJ Byrd and line-backer Dannell Ellerbe looked to maximize their chances of sticking in the league by signing with defensive-minded clubs Tampa Deviced Politicals and Politicals their chances of sticking in the league by signing with defensive-minded clubs Tampa Bay and Baltimore, respectively. Also, full-back Brannan Southerland signed with the New York Jets and cornerback Ramarcus Brown inked a free agent deal with San Diego, while wide receivers Demiko Goodman and Kenneth Harris will try to make the rosters of Pittsburgh and New Orleans, respectively. Unlike the free agents, Stafford, the No. 1 pick of the 2009 draft, has his spot in the league guaranteed for quite some time, as he has already signed a sixyear, \$78 million contract with Detroit.

The men's basketball team also got into the signing mix last week, as new head coach Mark Fox announced his first-ever signee at Georgia, Vincent Williams, a 6-foot-1 point guard from Homestead, Fla. As a senior, Williams averaged 26 points and nearly six assists a game. His signing put the Bulldogs' 2009 class back at two, after fall signee Daniel Miller was released from his Letter of Intent. Franklin County guard DeMario

Intent. Franklin County guard DeMario Mayfield is the Bulldogs' other signee. The spring signing period ends on May 20th.

center originally signed with the Bulldogs, but he was released from his commitment after head coach Dennis Felton was fired midway through last season. Miller and Favors join an impressive Georgia Technesermiting class that includes Kammeon recruiting class that includes Kammeon Holsey, Brian Oliver, Glen Rice, Jr., and Mfon Udofia.

The men's and women's tennis teams were not as fortunate in their respective conference championships. In a surprising upset, the seventh-ranked women lost a quarterfinal clash to No. 17 Florida State by the narrowest possible margin of 4-3. # NEXT ROUND



## What we learned in Round 1: How will the Hawks' stars fare against the Cavs?

It may not have been pretty and it certainly took them long enough (seven games and 15 days, to be exact), but the Hawks outlasted the Heat in the first round of the 2009 NBA Playoffs last Sunday, moving on to the second round of the postseason for the first time since the 1999 season. In defeating the Heat in seven games, Atlanta's first sevengame series victory in 39 years, the Hawks gave their fans plenty of to see, some of it good and, inevitably, some bad. Then, with Atlanta's postseason advancement in mind, here's a look at how some notable Hawks performed against Dwyane Wade and the Heat in Round 1 and how I expect them to contribute against the Cavs from Cleveland in Round 2.

THE PLAYERS ...
Mike Bibby: For the series, Bibby scored 14.9 points, shooting 47 percent from the floor, and dished out 4.4 assists in 36.4 minutes per game. While he was never really exceptional—though he did score 20 first-half points in Game 6 before going scoreless in the second half—Bibby was one of Atlanta's most consistent performers.

Against Cleveland, Bibby earns the right of matching up with Cavs All-Star point guard Mo Williams. Williams is a deadly 3point shooter and scores nearly 18 points a game (17.8), meaning Bibby's value will not just be found behind the 3-point line on the offensive end of the floor, but also in denying penetration and outside shooting on the defensive side of things as well.

Joe Johnson: Considering Joe is the team leader and its one and only All-Star, he had what could only be considered a disappointing first-round series against the Heat. His 17.1 points per game average was more than four points below his season scoring average and he shot only 41.5 percent from the floor. Still, Big Shot Joe did a lot to redeem his mediocre play by putting up a team-high 27 points in the series finale in addition to recording four assists and five rebounds.

In Round 2, Joe will have to take his game to a level it's never been before, as Cleveland will be sure to slow the tempo of the series, forcing the Hawks into half-court sets where only Joe excels.

Zaza Pachulia: Believe it or not, Z-Pac may have been the MVP of Atlanta's firstround series, using heart and hustle to track down loose balls and provide easy garbage points, igniting game-changing plays/runs. To illustrate just how big a role Zaza played in the Round 1 victory, check out what Heat forward James Jones said of Pachulia after Atlanta's all-important, series-changing, Game-4 W: "They made all the plays. Zaza was the guy who every time they needed a big play, he made it. Whether it was a rebound, a tip or a layup, he was the momentum breaker tonight and I think he kind of sealed our fate.'

With the height and physicality of Cavs center Zydrunas Ilgauskas sure to give Hawks center Al Horford problems, Pachulia's defense and energy off the bench—that is, if head coach Mike Woodson doesn't choose to start the Republic of Georgia native against Cleveland's big, physical front line—will be

key in the series outcome.

Josh Smith: Perhaps the Hawks' most emotional player, outside of the aforementioned Z-Pac of course, Smith began the series on a high note, contributing a doubledouble in each of Atlanta's first two games at home. While he slowed down a bit as the series progressed, posting below average marks in Games 3, 4 and 6, J-Smoove's scoring, rebounding and shot-blocking averages in the first round were all elevated from his regular-season numbers, though his postseason shooting percentage was down a full


seven percentage points.

As for the series against Cleveland, though Joe is the team leader and no doubt its best player, his overall consistency compared to Smith's relative lack thereof make J-Smoove possibly the most important Hawk in Round 2. He will most likely be guarded by Cleveland power forward Anderson Varejao, who is a good player and high-energy guy but lacks the speed and athleticism to run with Smith. Smith's main value can be found in the open floor, where the Hawks, too, happen to be at their best, and his ability to turn games into track meets rather than half-court chess matches will go a long way in deciding the outcome of this second-round matchup.

# WRAPPING UP THE DRAFT

## DT Jerry leads athletic group of defenders

With the acquisition of tight end Tony Gonzalez, the Falcons were freed up to focus almost entirely on the defense in this year's NFL Draft. Here's a rundown of the team's eight picks.

Peria Jerry: Atlanta filled one of its defensive holes when its picked Jerry No. 24 overall. The 6-foot-2, 290-pound defensive tackle was one of the more dominant inside forces in college football last season at Ole Miss. He led the SEC in tackles for loss with 18, and also made seven sacks. He could very well start right away. "We are very excited about having Peria on board," said Falcons general manager Thomas Dimitroff. "Peria is a big, strong, country guy. He is going to hold the point of attack. He also has the ability to be a one-gap guy and be disruptive behind the line of scrimmage." ESPN and the Associated Press rewarded Jerry's standout senior season by voting him first-team All-America.

William Moore: Like Jerry, Moore should challenge for a starting spot this fall. The former Missouri Tiger was projected as one of the top safeties after his junior season in which he notched eight interceptions, ranking first on the all-time single-season list at Mizzou. But Moore suffered through a tough senior campaign, as questions about the mental side of his game arose and his stock plummeted. However, Moore did play with an injured foot that bothered him ever since the first game of the season. "He is a downhill. blow-you-up kind of tackler," Dimitroff said. "He's a guy that is very physical on the field, but he also has range. He is a mid-4.4 guy, so he has speed for us. This guy definitely brings speed and urgency to our football team and this defense." Draft guru Mel Kiper called Moore one of the hidden gems in the draft in the buildup to the event, predicting that Moore's junior season was far more indicative of his capabilities.

## **SECOND-DAY SELECTIONS ...**

**Chris Owens:** Dimitroff continued to focus on the defense with the first pick of Day 2. He took San Jose State's Chris Owens with the 90th pick in the third round. Owens started 38 games as a Spartan, making 228 tackles and 13 picks. The 13 interceptions were tied for second in SJSU history.

Lawrence Sidbury: Jamaal Anderson's continued struggles at the defensive end position opened up the possibility of drafting a player to push him in training camp, and

perhaps eventually win the job. Although he played his college ball at an FCS school in Richmond, Sidbury has huge potential. He made 11.5 sacks in 2008, the third highest single-season mark in team history.

William Middleton: The Falcons drafted an Atlanta native in Middleton, who attended The Marist School. Middleton started for three seasons at Furman, accumulating 186 tackles, 16.5 of them for a loss, and seven interceptions.

Garrett Reynolds: Atlanta traded up to get the mammoth offensive tackle out of North Carolina. Reynolds made 26 starts at right tackle as a Tar Heel, and was selected second team All-ACC by the Associated Press last year. Standing at, 6-7, 310 pounds, Reynolds certainly has the size to compete.

Spencer Adkins: Linebacker Spencer Adkins could help provide depth at the position, and also could play on special teams early on for Atlanta. The 156th overall pick made 72 career tackles at the University of Miami, and recorded a career-high 52 tackles in the 2007 season.

Vance Walker: The Georgia Tech product was a huge part of the Jackets' resurgence on the defensive side of the ball over the last few seasons. He made 8.5 sacks in 2007 from the defensive tackle position.

## UNDRAFTED FREE AGENTS ...

The Falcons signed 10 undrafted free agents after the draft. Among them was former Alabama Crimson Tide quarterback John Parker Wilson, who will push D.J. Shockley for the third-string quarterback job in training camp. Wilson passed for 7,894 yards in his time at Tuscaloosa. Florida State linebacker Derek Nicholson also got the call from Dimitroff. He led the 'Noles in tackles last season with 81. Another ACC product in Aaron Kelly will enter the mix. A graduate of Walton High School in Marietta, Kelly made 67 catches for 722 yards and four touchdowns his senior season. Kelly's 20 career touchdown catches are also the most in Tiger history. Joining them are wide receiver Darren Mougey (San Diego State), defensive end Maurice Lucas (Colorado), long snapper Robert Shiver (Auburn), offensive lineman Ryan Stanchek (West Virginia), offensive lineman Jose Valdez (Arkansas), punter/kicker Robbie Dehaze (Northern Arizona) and linebacker Brock Christopher (Missouri).


