



PGA trumps British as a major tournament

MAKING PROGRESS



Falcons blend of talent coming together

On Jan. 15, The Atlanta Falcons' promising season came to a screeching halt in an embarrassing 48-21 home defeat to the Green Bay Packers. Seven months later, it's become clear that the Birds have put that loss behind them, and the word out of training camp is that they're ready to take another step forward and become true Super Bowl contenders for the first time under fourth-year head coach Mike Smith.

Coming off a 13-3 season, the Falcons needed some tweaking over the summer, rather than an overhaul. And with the arrival of several promising young rookies, a continually progressing defensive unit could find itself in the top-half of the league this season. Coupled with a potentially dynamic offense, this is clearly a team in the early mix for a spot in Indianapolis at Super Bowl XLVI.

YOUTH IS SERVED ...

Falcons general manager Thomas Dimitroff made perhaps the boldest move of the offseason on draft day, trading a plethora of future picks in order to move into the top ten and draft

former Alabama wideout Julio Jones. These sorts of deals have not exactly been routine under the two-time NFL Executive of the Year, who has typically been conservative when it comes to draft day deals. But the prospect of having a 6-foot-3, 220-pound wideout oozing with talent was simply too much to pass up.

Four months later, all signs point to the Jones move being yet another notch on the belt of Dimitroff, who has nabbed an array of young talent for the team during his time, building an impressive young core on both sides of the football. The rookie was present for all of the optional practices over the summer, working with the likes of Matt Ryan, Roddy White and Tony Gonzalez, despite the impending lockout looming over their heads.

And when it came time for Jones to hit the field, he hit the ground running. The rookie showed off some speed that Falcons fans haven't seen on the outside for some time with his two catches that went for 43 yards, and a 12-yard run off a reverse that went for a first down.

Obviously it's early, but the idea of the big and fast Jones lining up across from one

of the league's elite wideouts in White has to have the Falcons licking their chops, and opposing defenses shaking in their boots.

Although Jones may be the prize of the bunch, he isn't the only youngster making noise in camp. Sean Weatherspoon showed signs of promise at outside linebacker and just needs to stay healthy this time around. Everyone at camp is also raving about the upand-coming safety tandem of William Moore and Thomas DeCoud.

NOT A "WEAKNESS" ANYMORE ...

While the addition of Jones to an already strong offense is sure to excite, the progress on the defensive side should have fans just as giddy. Once seen as Atlanta's Achilles' heel, Brian Van Gorder's bunch has made steady progress over the past few seasons and is looking to make the jump and become a truly reliable unit this season. The acquisition of defensive end Ray Edwards (16.5 sacks over the last two seasons) speaks volumes about their expectations for this year, as he could be the final piece required in turning the defense into one of the league's better units.

Just look at how the first-team defense performed in their first two preseason matchups. It didn't take long for the birds to impress in their first matchup of the preaseason against the Miami Dolphins. The "D" forced Chad Henne into two interceptions (courtesy of John Abraham and Brent Grimes) and a three-and-out during their time on the field. Their play helped the first team to an impressive 17-0 lead after one before Smith brought in the second-teamers.

Game 2 against Jacksonville brought similar results, as the defense played most of the first half and held the Jags to just three points. The Falcons forced turnovers on two of the Jags' first three possessions, getting an interception from Brent Grimes and a fumble recovery from Weatherspoon, and then forced the home team into four consecutive punts by halftime.

AS FOR THE OFFENSE ...

The emergence of a multitude of young

stars and the continued improvement of the defense are certainly reasons for optimism. But if all goes to plan, it's the offense that should be the teams' strength this season.

Michael Turner, Roddy White and Tony Gonzalez are all back while franchise QB Matt Ryan has another year of experience under his belt (with postseason experience included). Ryan is looking to make the leap into that elite group of quarterbacks. All four of those players should contend for a Pro Bowl spot this season.

Much like the defense, the first-team offense has impressed thus far. They looked dominant against Miami, getting the aforementioned fine performance from Jones, while Ryan looked accurate and poised, and Turner was strong with a touchdown run and 21 yards on four carries.

Meanwhile, Harry Douglas seems to have returned to his form of his rookie season, as the speedy slot receiver caught touchdowns of 20 and 76 yards in the first two preseason victories. Douglas adds yet another weapon to an offense that looks next to impossible to stop thanks to a versatile collection of weapons all over the field.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN? ...

Sure, it's just preseason. And yes, we've seen similarly fine performances in training camp mean absolutely nothing once the season starts. But this Falcons team was a good one last year despite the playoff blowout, and they've only added quality pieces such as Jones and Edwards. Veterans Ryan, Grimes, Weatherspoon, Douglas and other key pieces all look to be heading into the best football of their careers.

Couple that season emerging youth with the calming veteran hands of perhaps the top tight end of all time in Gonzalez, a perennial Pro Bowler in White and the return of the likes of Curtis Lofton, Abraham and more on the defensive side, and this is clearly a team to be reckoned with this fall.

Weekend full of exciting sports action

This past week included a jam-packed schedule for the city of Atlanta and the sports teams it yields. Events held in this great city this week ranged from the Metro PCS Corky Kell Classic to the TOUR Championship by Coca-Cola press conference. Let's not forget that the Falcons played a preseason matchup in Jacksonville.

CAUSING TURNOVERS ...

On Friday night, the Falcons faced off against the Jacksonville Jaguars in a 15-13 defeat. Despite the loss in a preseason matchup, the first-team defense continued to impress. They recorded two turnovers in the first quarter, a Brent Grimes 62-yard interception and a Sean Weatherspoon fumble recovery, to generate five turnovers in as many quarters of play in the preseason. The offense also performed well as Matt Ryan completed 7-for-15 for 116 yards and a touchdown; the lone

touchdown was a 76-yard touchdown reception by Harry Douglas.

REVENGE OF COBB ...

Continuing on the gridiron, the Metro PCS Corky Kell Classic took place at the Georgia Dome on Saturday with four separate games. The opening game slated a rematch from last year's event between No. 4 Grayson and No. 6 Kell. The Rams avenged last season's 13-10 loss to the Longhorns in this year's grudge match. Grayson's only scoring drive occurred after they recovered a muffed punt on the Kell five. It was a one play run by Robert Nkemdiche. This week Kell has a bye while the Rams play Edgewater (Fla.) in the Progressive Football Challenge hosted by North Gwinnett.

The second game of the Kell Classic featured Lassiter and the defending state champions, Brookwood. The Trojans upset the

Broncos 14-6 despite trailing 6-0 at the half. Lassiter, however, did not gain the lead until a 43-yard touchdown reception by WR Juwan Dickey and extra point by Alex Hanks in the fourth quarter. Brookwood then moved into Lassiter territory, but was soon stifled when Lassiter's Ryan Gildea forced a fumble that was recovered by teammate Zach Word. This ended up turning into the final blow for the Broncos as Lassiter would end up scoring another touchdown and forcing a turnover on downs to end the game. Brookwood and Lassiter do not play again until Sept. 2 when they face Collins Hill and Sprayberry respectively.

Game 3 on Saturday pitted a matchup of McEachern versus North Gwinnett. The Indians came up on top in a 26-17 victory in which they scored their last two touchdowns in the game's final 10 seconds. The first touchdown gave McEachern a 20-17 lead when Chris Nwagbara scored a 4-yard touchdown run to cap off a 75-yard drive. In order to comeback with limited time at hand, North Gwinnett's Scott Hosch made a pass down field but was picked off by C.J. Cody for six. This marks only the second victory in the last six Kell Classics for the Indians. The Bulldogs face off against East St. Louis (Ill.) this week in the Progressive Football Challenge while McEachern plays at Lowndes on Sept. 2.

To wrap up the Kell Classic, Walton defeated Peachtree Ridge 26-14. The Raider victory came with the emergence of junior running back Tyren Jones. The Lassiter rushed for 213 yards and two touchdowns. However, he truly turned up the heat in the second half when he compiled 175 yards of his total. The play of the day for Jones occurred on an 80-yard touchdown run to untie the game at 20-14 in third quarter. Both teams next play on Sept. 2 with Walton facing off at Milton and Peachtree Ridge at Roswell.

TOUR CHAMPIONSHIP ...

After the busy weekend at the Dome, the attention shifted to East Lake Golf Course in the eastern part of the city where the TOUR Championship by Coca-Cola held its annual press conference. Sept. 22-

25 marks the 11th consecutive Tour Championship held at East Lake and the fifth final to the PGA TOUR Playoffs for the FedEx Cup. Since it is the final event of the playoffs, 30 players partake in the event thus there is no cut and FedEx Cup points are reset to give all players a mathematical chance of winning the Cup.

This year, the tournament unveiled a new name and logo. Now called the TOUR Championship by Coca-Cola, the tournament explained their renewed partnership with Coca-Cola and Southern Company through 2016. Coca-Cola resembles the presenting sponsor while Southern Company is proud supporter of the event. The logo features Coca-Cola's classic bottle and a golf ball juxtaposing each other.

"The Coca-Cola Company's strong leadership in the Atlanta community continues to help grow the tournament which ultimately increases our ability to raise more money for charity," exclaimed Todd Rhinehart, executive director of the TOUR Championship by Coca-Cola. "As we prepare to host the tournament at East Lake Golf Club for the 11th time, we believe this new logo symbolizes The Coca-Cola Company's commitment to increasing the reach and impact of the culmination of the Fed-ExCup, which will allow us to create a new on-site experience for our fans this September at East Lake."

Also new this year is active, retired and Reserve military members and their families receive free admission to the event all weekend with a valid military ID. Thursday, Sept. 22, will be known as Military Appreciation Day when a military appreciation ceremony will take place on the first tee an hour prior to the first tee time.

"We are happy to support our nation's men and women in uniform and their families," said Rhinehart. "The tournament, the PGA TOUR and our players value the sacrifice that the men and women in uniform and their families make for our country."

ASA helps grads earn scholarships

The Atlanta Sports Academy (ASA) offers post-graduate sports programs for students who have completed their high school eligibility and are seeking assistance with obtaining athletic scholarships at four-year colleges and universities. The student-athletes who enroll in Atlanta Sports Academy's program benefit by: earning higher scores and grades for college acceptance, building better self-discipline for further success in college, and providing more time for students to mature prior to playing collegiate sports. The program pushes students in practice, tests their character and leadership, and gets them more focus on their education.

Founded in 2009 by former University of North Carolina football player Damon Dawson and former Auburn University football player Viondi Pate, Atlanta Sports Academy is the only sports academy in the state of Georgia. With little funding, Dawson and Pate initially worked from their virtual office in downtown Atlanta. The primary focus of the program was to assist high school students with obtaining and maintaining their football development, while supporting students in the transition from high school to collegiate athletics.

Though the two were successful with focusing on athletics, they were not completely satisfied. In April 2010, with the aid of Ira Dawson, the Atlanta Sports Academy began the academic portion of the institution. This addition included study hall, ACT/SAT preparation through Kaplan and GED completion assistance. With these changes came a location move as well, as the academy moved into a townhouse in Hampton, Ga. Subsequently, all the hard work and dedication of the founders led to a full campus in 2011, which houses over 200 student-athletes.

ASA celebrated this groundbreaking event with more than 75 friends, family, city officials, business owners and media. During, the ceremony, ASA honored a special young





Meruelo's plans to expand the fan base are largely based on simply winning games, but he also told the press that he hopes to inspire more interest by earning the "respect and loyalty" of the fans.

Meanwhile, Ganis says he just might be the right man for the job.

"He's not a neophyte," Ganis said. "He's done a lot of homework, more than a lot of owners who get into this."



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
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
