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Warren County coverage reaches Atlanta

The melee that followed the Hancock Central/Warren County game is certainly a shame and it is shaping up to perhaps be a national story based on the timing. The incident happened just 24 hours before Grantham and Franklin got into it in Nashville and on the same weekend Harbaugh and Schwartz needed to be separated. The Hancock Central/Warren County incident, though, was far worse as the Warren County coach went to the hospital.

After some information trickled out initially from Augusta-area news outlets, Score Atlanta and the rest of the Atlanta media jumped on it quickly and hopefully helped to bring light to an awful situation. Score Atlanta was able to speak with Warren County Schools Superintendent Carole Jean Carey early Tuesday morning, less than 24 hours after football coach David Daniel was released from the hospital. 790 The Zone had Carey on the next morning for a follow-up. Carey is fighting for her coach and she really came across as willing to do whatever it takes to see that justice is served.

FAN VS. ZONE ...

It is interesting to hear the two different approaches taken by the two sports talk radio stations here in Atlanta to their broadcast properties. For years, 680 The Fan was known as the flagship of the Thrashers and now the

Braves and it seemed that Buck "Blue Skies" Belue and Leo Mazzone always talked about how great things were in Braves Country, even when the Braves were choking down the stretch or gagging in all of the series against Washington and Florida.

It sounded like everything was always peachy in Blueland despite the fact that the team had just one playoff appearance and onair personalities would make excuses for the team instead of calling out the ownership and management for poor execution.

On the flip side, it sounds as though 790 The Zone is really taking the Falcons to task for a 2-3, now 3-3 start, including ripping the punter on a regular basis. 

New-look Gladiators take over Atlanta

After coming off of a 30-34-8 season and missing the playoffs, the Gwinnett Gladiators feel a new-look squad can lead them to the Promised Land. On Friday night at the Arena at Gwinnett Center, Atlanta's only professional hockey team will awe fans when the Gladiators take the ice against the defending South Division champion Greenville Road Warriors for the 2011-2012 home opener.

John Wroblewski takes the reigns for this season replacing Jeff Pyle, the only other head coach in franchise history. Pyle left the Gladiators to take the same position with the Texas Stars of the American Hockey League.

"It is [exciting] for the Gladiators to an-

nounce our new head coach," exclaimed team president Steve Chapman. "We were looking for the right fit for what we do – play exciting hockey, develop talent and young men and be an asset in our community. John Wroblewski fit exactly what we were looking for in a coach. He has the credentials and the background in developing hockey players. He has the character and the commitment that fit our philosophy and he has the passion to get it done. I'm looking forward to working with John in accomplishing our goals."

TRACK RECORD OF SUCCESS ...

Wroblewski joins the Gladiators after serving as an assistant coach for the Wheeling Nailers last season. With the help of Wroblewski, the Nailers achieved their best postseason finish since 1998 by advancing to the Eastern Conference Finals. Prior to coaching Wheeling, Wroblewski got his start by coaching the USA Hockey Under-18 National Development Program from 2007 to 2010. In 2010 he led the team to a Gold Medal finish in Minsk, Belarus.

"John was honestly one of the most prepared individuals that I have ever interviewed for a job of any kind," said Chapman. "His background with the National Team and as an assistant in our league provided the right mix of knowledge in terms of recruiting and development. His X's and O's and the style of game that he wants to implement – up-tempo and aggressive – were detailed and in line with our goals. And his passion and energy fit exactly what we were looking for in a coach. His age will not be an issue. Heck, there are NHL Head Coaches that are only a few years older than John. We're

very happy to give him his first opportunity to take the helm in pro hockey."

In addition to Wroblewski's hiring, the Gladiators signed former defenseman Rick Emmett as an assistant coach for the upcoming season. Emmett played with the Gladiators from 2003 to 2006 and helped lead the team to the 2006 American Conference title. In total, he played 11 seasons professionally in the East Coast Hockey League, International Hockey League and the United Hockey League.

NEW PARENT CLUBS ...

Besides the hirings of Wroblewski and Emmett, the Gladiators also signed new affiliation agreements with the Phoenix Coyotes and the Buffalo Sabres of the NHL to mark the team's fourth and fifth NHL affiliates. Gwinnett will now serve as an ECHL affiliate for two NHL teams for the third time in team history. The other instances occurred during the 2008-09 season with Chicago and Atlanta, and during the 2009-10 campaign with Columbus and Atlanta.

"Having two affiliates could be a challenge," said Chapman. "We could be stocked very well by our affiliates. Gwinnett should have several good prospects, but any of those players can be called up at any time, leaving the team short-handed. I know we will pull together and battle during the call-ups. It is a challenge for the die-hard fans to endure the mass call-ups, but that is part of the game and it's good for the prospects. I think we have the leadership in place behind the bench and on the ice to see us through."

During the team's first eight seasons, 156 call-ups involving 112 players have transpired. Over the past four seasons, the Gladiators have had approximately 22 player callups to the American Hockey League and in 2009-10 they set a team record with 28.

"Buffalo is an appealing affiliate to us for many reasons," said Chapman. "They have always been an organization that builds within their own system. The new ownership in Buffalo supports the philosophy of building from within. In addition, Wrobo's [Wroblewski] relationship with Ron Rolston, the head coach in Rochester, cemented the connection. We're looking forward to beginning a strong relationship with the Sabres of developing talented players and upstanding individuals."

This year also represents the first season since Gwinnett's inception that it is not an affiliate of the Atlanta Thrashers for the assignment of draft prospects and player development because of the franchise's recent relocation to Winnipeg, Manitoba.

In addition to new NHL affiliates, the Gladiators made a deal this fall to acquire Alpharetta native Brad Miller from the Trenton Titans for Dustin Cameron. Last season, Miller split time between Trenton and Elmira, where he earned a combined 23 points (eight goals, 15 assists). He began playing professionally in 2009 with the Idaho Steelheads and played collegiately at the University of North Dakota. Back in his youth days, Miller played for the Atlanta Fire at The Cooler and won three national titles for the "Cooler Selects" roller hockey team.

With this group, Gwinnett hopes a special season is in store. After splitting the first two games of the season on the road with the Florida Everblades, a 3-2 loss and a 2-1, 11-round shootout victory, the Gladiators seek the backing of the home crowd to beat Greenville.

For the opening series, fans will be given magnetic schedules on Friday and wall calendars on Saturday. Before the games, defensemen Paul Flache and Brad Miller will sign autographs on Friday while forward Andy Brandt and defenseman Will Colbert will sign on Saturday. Come on out to the Arena at Gwinnett Center and bring the whole family for a funfilled day. Gates open up to the public at 6:35 p.m. on Friday and at 6:05 p.m. on Saturday.



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Investigation ongoing in assault case

Warren County Superintendent of Schools Carole Jean Carey was on hand in Sparta last Friday night when a Hancock Central player assaulted Warren County head coach David Daniel, sending the Screaming Devils coach to the heapital. According to Carey she coach to the hospital. According to Carey, she was walking back to the locker room with Daniel when the fracas started. "We saw helmets go up and he (Daniel) took off with the offensive coordinator."

Carey said that she and Daniel were 30-40 feet away from the players when the melee broke out initially. The Warren County locker room was locked, according to Carey, and the team was standing outside the doors when a Hancock Central player smacked a Warren County player. Carey was putting equipment on the truck when she saw Daniel get struck. Daniel was taken to University Hospital before he was transferred and eventually released on Monday, according to Carey. The Augusta Chronicle reported that Daniel suffered fractures around his cheek, nose and right eye that will require major reconstructive surgery.

Assistant coach Jim Turner has been Assistant coach Jim Turner has been serving as acting head coach but Daniel is still involved in the team's game plan. "He was breaking down film last night and he's leading from afar right now," said Carey. "He might be in the press box (for the upcoming game), but right now we just don't know. It's too early to tell."

INVESTIGATION BEGINS ...

As far as the investigation, the Hancock County Sheriff's Department denied Carey's request for GBI involvement, but that hasn't deterred the Warren County Schools Super-intendent. "I am working through the board

attorney to petition the DA or the Attorney General to get the Bureau's involvement. Carey said that there are different facets to the case, more than just the assault on Daniel. "A lot of things are going on. A few other things happened." Carey did not wish to comment on the other incidents until after the investigation but she is looking out for Daniel. "We need to hold the person accountable that did this to Coach Daniel."

GHSA spokesman Steve Figueroa said the organization is waiting until authorities finish their investigation before they can get involved. "We will monitor what happens and then act," said Figueroa. However, the GHSA cannot rule on this issue due to the fact that it took place after the game and off the field of play. "It is similar to a fight in the lunch room," said Figueroa.

The only thing the GHSA could rule on

is if the host school, in this case Hancock Central, were to be found guilty of not providing a safe atmosphere for the game. In this case, the GHSA could either fine the school or put the school on probation, possibly being ruled ineligible for the playoffs.

North Gwinnett defense stepping up

According to the GHSA, Athens Christian will have to forfeit three wins due to the use of a player that did not meet the GHSA standards for eligibility regarding foreign exchange students and was therefore ineligible to play in six varsity games. The victories over Hebron Christian, Banks County and Social Circle will be vacated.



Donald Russell rushed for a season-high 85 yards on 15 car-

ries and one touchdown, his seventh of the season. Christian Benvenuto kicked two field goals from 23 and 40 yards out and Michael Hall led with 11 total tackles.

"We've got to learn to finish the job," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "But we took another step forward, and we've got to look at it that way. We were in position to give ourselves a chance to win." Georgia State's next game is Oct. 22 when it hosts South Alabama in the Georgia Dome. On Sunday, the Falcons of the Mike Smith era did what they do best. They "defended the Dome" with a 31-17 victory over an NFC South divisional rival, the Carolina Panthers.

The Falcons won the game in large part because they used running back Michael Turner to win the possession battle and kept Carolina's rookie phenom, quarterback Cam Newton, off the field and playing from behind. Turner rushed for 139 yards and two touchdowns on 27 carries. After the game he was a little nicked up and bruised from his efforts, but at the same time, he inflicted more punishment than he absorbed.

On the season, the Falcons are 2-1 in games in which Turner rushes for 100 or more yards. It seemed as though the Falcons wanted to send Carolina a message from the first play from scrimmage. Utilizing back-up Reggie Kelly, Atlanta started its first drive in a double tight end formation. That physical tone allowed the Falcons to win the time of possession battle on Sunday despite running fewer plays than Carolina.

Turner's efforts certainly showed up in other areas of the statistics as well. Quarterback Matt Ryan recorded a 101.1 passer rating on the day, while only throwing for 163 yards (with one touchdown and no interceptions) on 14 completions. At no point in the game was Ryan forced to make an ill-advised throw just to create instant offense.

On the defensive side of the ball, the Fal-

cons pinned their ears back and went after last year's Heisman Trophy winner. Newton looked good early, proving to be a strong force in the pocket. He delivered accurate passes and was able to scramble for first downs, but at key times Newton was forced to make too many big plays, and the Falcons defense took full advantage. He was hit eight times in the pocket, sacked twice and threw three interceptions.

MEGATRON AND COMPANY ...

This week, the Falcons travel to Ford Field to take on the upstart Detroit Lions (5-1). The Lions' top playmakers should be familiar to football fans in and around Atlanta. Former Georgia quarterback Matthew Stafford is making quite a connection with former Tech wide receiver Calvin Johnson. Through six games, Stafford has thrown Johnson a league-best nine touchdowns.

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


