GPB games enthrall football fans

The postseason is nearly here for Georgia high school football, and GPB has been in the key places for region showdowns recently. After being on hand for Grayson returning a late interception to edge Brookwood and win the Region 8-AAAAA crown, GPB TV will be on hand Friday in Suwanee as the Region 7-AAAAA title is settled between North Gwinnett and Peachtree Ridge. Not to be outdone, the GPB webcast saw Alpharetta rally back to beat Centennial and claim the Region 6-AAAAA crown. This week's webcast heads down to Winnersville for Colquitt County battling Valdosta for 1-AAAAA's title. Four loaded games over two weeks on the GPB family of networks.

And if you are into filling out brackets, be sure and catch GPB's bracket reveal this Friday after the North Gwinnett/Peachtree Ridge game on GPB TV and GPB.org/sports.

THE YOUTUBE WAR ...

The Grayson/Brookwood game is always entertaining (this is the second straight year GPB has covered the game), but this year the game was amped up another notch by YouTube. Three Grayson students got together to create a video entitled, "Brookwood, Where You At?" that hit the web and quickly went viral. Naturally, Brookwood responded with its own video just days be-

fore the game that is still circulating the internet. The video war was covered by Score Atlanta, GPB, the AJC, the Gwinnett Daily Post and eventually made its way to the West Coast. American Idol host and Georgia native Ryan Seacrest tweeted to his followers the links to the videos and marveled at how rivalries have changed since he went to Dunwoody High School.

It was interesting to hear how Tony La Russa's World Series victory and immediate retirement will be played out here in Atlanta over the next few months. La Russa's St. Louis Cardinals rallied back to win the World Series over the Texas Rangers in seven games, giving La Russa his second title with the Cardinals and third overall as a manager. La Russa made six World Series appearances, three with Oakland with one win in 1989 and three with the Cardinals. He was a four-time Manager of the Year and finished with 2,728 career wins against 2,365 losses over 33 seasons. La Russa ranks third all-time, just 35 wins behind John McGraw. La Russa also has 224 more wins than Bobby Cox, who retired after last season from Atlanta.

Comparing La Russa and Cox is interesting because both managed in both leagues. Cox is obviously known for his time spent in Atlanta while La Russa achieved World Series victories in both Oakland and St. Louis,

bringing into question his Hall of Fame "hat" decision. La Russa won just 11 division crowns but does have three ultimate crowns to his resume. Cox arguers will say that his winning percentage, is better and he did it in four fewer seasons with just one less trip to the World Series.

COCKTAIL PARTY REACTION...

Believe it or not, neither LSU nor Alabama appeared in CBS's Saturday afternoon game of the day, as Georgia and Florida competing in the World's Largest Outdoor Cocktail Party took center stage. NOTE: both LSU and Alabama had a bye week to prepare for their epic showdown which was moved to primetime for better ratings. In its first, and likely only appearance on CBS in the Saturday prime slot this year, the Dawgs fell behind early to the Gators, allowing CBS to run through its no-doubt prepared script of how Florida owns Georgia.

Interestingly enough, though, Gary Danielson sounded a bit annoyed by new Gators head coach Will Muschamp after the staff misled CBS on the injury status of several players for the game. I have heard of gamesmanship in terms of not warming up John Brantley with the rest of the team to try and deek out the Georgia defensive coaching staff, but to purposely lie to the CBS announcing crew? That is another example of Will Muschamp perhaps not being ready for the major leagues.

As a person who calls football games on a regular basis and speaks with coaches leading up to the games, I am told all of the time inside information that the coach follows up with "don't let that go until after the game has started." You understand what is on the record that can be discussed leading up to the game and what is off limits until during the game or perhaps not at all. Muschamp should have been honest with Danielson about the injury status and just put the embargo on it until after the broadcast had started. This is another example of Muschamp coming off as a crazy person and his leash may be tightening in Gainesville, especially after losing to the Dawgs.

Speaking of the Georgia/Florida coverage, the AJC sent Mark Bradley down to Jacksonville to write about the Dawgs. I wonder if Bradley's pre-written "Georgia Lost; Fire Richt" column went to the same place as those Miami Heat: NBA Champs shirts and hats from this past summer.

Certainly it had to pain Bradley to type, "At this moment, it's almost impossible to imagine Georgia parting ways with this coach anytime soon." Or perhaps that is exactly what Bradley wanted so another one of his favorite bullseyes doesn't leave town. After Paul Hewitt left and Bobby Cox retired, Bradley was running short on column ideas. Good thing Richt might just stick around.

For true college football fans out there bored with the Pam Ward game on ESPNU or another game with Urban Meyer talking about the Big Ten, might I suggest the Southern Conference game of the week every Saturday on GPB TV. Last week No. 1 Georgia Southern's rally against No. 5 Appalachian State fell just short, but the game was exciting and each game has seemingly come down to the wire. The Southern Conference is a part of the FCS, but the football is still at a high quality and fans of Georgia high school football will see plenty of familiar names from the past few years. Give this week's game a chance in commercials of others. You may just become hooked.

PREP FOOTBALL



Atlanta area full of championship contenders

The time has come again. As we go deeper in the fall, the high school football playoff picture has become clearer. Many teams have already locked up their respective region titles with others still vying for spots. Of the teams who have already clinched postseason spots, only a few truly have stood out above the rest in the metro Atlanta area.

Many of the teams who have a great shot at taking home the hardware come from Cobb County. With teams such as Allatoona, Hill-grove, McEachern and Walton, Cobb could earn its first state title since 1967, when Marietta defeated Columbus 14-7.

THE RAIDERS ...

By defeating Marietta 42-14 on Oct. 28, Walton, ranked fourth in the Score Atlanta poll, clinched its first region title since 2008. A main reason for the Raiders success this season has come from junior running back Tyren Jones and his ability to shred defenses. Through the first nine games of the season, Jones has already racked up 1,530 yards on 217 carries and 22 touchdowns. He also averages 7.1 yards per carry.

"We have always been a run-oriented football team, and he fits well into what we do," stated head coach Rocky Hidalgo, who has amassed a 22-8 record in two-plus seasons with Walton. "We have not changed what we do to accommodate him. ... He fits really well into what we do offensively and I think he has been a really nice fit there and he has paid huge dividends on Friday nights."

On the defensive side of the ball, the Blaylock brothers – Daron and Zack – have been a nightmare to opposing teams' passing attacks. Zack leads the team with seven interceptions, four of which went for six; both have 50 tackles apiece to lead the team. Come the postseason, this duo could shut down any prolific offense. Both brothers have committed to play for Kentucky next season.

"Their athleticism enable us to some things defensively to take some chances," remarked Hidalgo. "One, they are exceptional tacklers down the open field and with their foot speed. It is hard to make big play on us so I think that is one way we kind of do things defensively that we have not been able to do in the past because of their athleticism."

WAR PARTY ...

McEachern also has a great shot at winning it all by having played a difficult regular season schedule. To open the season, the Indians defeated North Gwinnett 26-17 at the

Georgia Dome in the Corky Kell Classic, followed by winning at Lowndes 20-13 in Week 2. The defeat of perennial powerhouses in the state helped boost McEachern's confidence and experience.

"We intentionally try to schedule some pretty tough opponents early in the season non-region really to help set us up [for postseason play] and we play playoff-caliber teams from around different spots like we will in the playoffs," stated McEachern head coach Kyle Hockman. "[For example], Lowndes and North Gwinnett are both darn good football teams and programs year in and year out. ... I think we know what we are getting into as the playoffs approach. It is going to be exciting."

The one game, however, on the Indians' schedule that truly stands out is the 12-10 loss to Hillgrove. The defeat to the local rivals served as a wakeup call for the Indians. They made a few adjustments that they may not have tweaked had a win occurred.

"We believe that by playing those type of opponents (like North Gwinnett, Lowndes and Hillgrove), you are going to find out what your strengths and weaknesses really," said Hockman. "I think it really forced us to take a good hard look [in the mirror]. When you play those teams like we did early and win, you think well we really do not need to make this adjustment but when you lose a game, it forces you to decide if you need to make adjustments so I think we are much better offensively in our run game and I think our young offensive line really stepped up physically."

The Indians offense has been led by Georgia State commit Trent Thompson at quarterback and wideout Amba Etta-Tawo, a Maryland commit, serves as one of Thompson's offensive weapons. Thompson, a three-year starter, averages around 200 yards passing a game and currently has 18 touchdown passes to four interceptions.

BULLDOGS ARE BACK ...

Gwinnett County has its fair share of teams that could make some noise in the postseason as well. One team in particular is a North Gwinnett squad that has the opportunity to lock up the top seed in Region 7-AAAAA with a victory Friday night over rival Peachtree Ridge.

After losing utility player C.J. Uzomah to graduation, the Bulldogs needed to find some offensive pieces to replace him at quarterback and receiver. Quarterback Scotty Hosch has filled in nicely by throwing for 1,900 yards thus far with 15 touchdowns and only three interceptions. At running back, Joe Jones has amassed 801 total yards on the season.

"Scott has had a pretty good year productivity wise at quarterback," said Bulldogs head coach Bob Sphire. "Joe Jones also has played pretty well the past few weeks at running back and our defense has been a collective effort. We have probably been strongest with our defensive front."

Defensive tackle Jordan Washington, who has committed to Mississippi State, leads the team in sacks and tackles for loss. J.D. Dilliard has also stepped up this season by recording 40 total tackles. If anything should be feared come the playoffs, it is the Bulldog defensive front that rotates in around six different players.

FIVE-PEAT? ...

Another team in the metro area that should not be taken lightly in the playoffs playoffs is the Buford Wolves, who seek their fifth consecutive state title and eighth since 2001. On defense, linebacker Dillon Lee, an Alabama commit, leads a defense that allows less than a touchdown a game. In five of the Wolves' games thus far, they have shut out opposing offenses.

Besides Buford, nationally-ranked Grayson also poses a threat come the playoffs. Junior Robert Nkemdiche, who currently has offers from Alabama, Florida, Georgia and plenty of others, anchors the defensive line. Some consider Nkemdiche to be one of the top recruits from the 2013 recruiting class. Nkemdiche leads a defense which allows about a touchdown a game. In last week's game at Brookwood, the Rams did just that by only allowing the Broncos offense to seven points on 185 total yards. The defense helped win the game with Kasey Gaines recording a key pick-six to score the eventual winning touchdown with a minute remaining.

The football playoffs are nearly here but plenty of other sports are playing out across the state and several titles have already been decided. The cross country region championships recently took place throughout the state and the drama was high in several events.

ON THE TRAILS ...

In the Region 7-5A boys race, Josh Brickell barely edged out Eric Westog and Mitch Flammang of Mill Creek. The Peachtree Ridge standout won with a time of 15:58. Mill Creek took home the title though, beating Norcross by two points. The Peachtree Ridge girls won the 7-5A event by placing four runners in the top 10 overall. Brookwood showed that it will be a program to be reckoned with in the state championships as both the boys and the girls won Region 8-5A. Morgan Malanoski beat teammate

Matthew McClintock to pace the Broncos. The Lady Broncos received a one-two finish from Caroline Kissel and QuanDra Shanks to beat out Parkview. Other programs that won both region championships included North Hall, St. Pius X, Milton, Harrison, Wesleyan and Westminster.

ON THE COURTS ...

Volleyball enthusiasts witnessed some incredible title tilts at Marietta High School last week as Pope, Walton, ELCA and Sandy Creek all won GHSA titles. Eagles Landing Christian won its first title in a thrilling five-set match. Greater Atlanta Christian won the fourth set 27-25 and was up 13-9 in the final frame, but ELCA's Mara Green rallied to score the final six points of the match. Green finished with 29 kills and 13 blocks. Sandy Creek pulled off a 3-0 sweep of St. Pius X in the 3A final.

In the two higher classification championships, Walton and Pope each extended a championship streak as the Raiders won their second in a row while Pope won its third straight. The Raiders needed five games to dispatch Harrison, the first time Walton need-ed even a fourth set in these playoffs. Kath-erine Plessy and Jessica Sloan helped Walton

erine Plessy and Jessica Sloan helped Walton build an early lead in the decisive set before Kelly Murphy helped finish off the Hoyas. Murphy finished with 24 kills and will now head off to the University of Michigan to play for the Wolverines.

Pope easily won the first set in its Class 4A title showdown with Whitewater before the Wildcats turned up the pressure on the defending champion Greyhounds. Whitewater took the second set and held a lead in the third but Pope righted the ship to win its second straight 4A crown, third overall title. Katie Bange and Mary Hannah Arrington were nearly unstoppable this season and Hange racked up 24 kills against Whitewater. Both seniors will play volleyball at the next level.

On the softball diamond in Columbus,

teams with a pedigree seemed to have an advantage. Buford found itself in the loser's bracket Friday night, needing three victories to win its fifth straight title. The Wolves exploded for nine runs against Blessed Trinity before taking down Pike County twice. Buford twice rallied from five runs down to best Pike County 11-10 in game one and won 12-2 in game two Kallie Case and Lexi Overstreet in game two. Kallie Case and Lexi Overstreet came up big for Buford throughout the tournament. Case hit four home runs and Over-

nament. Case hit four home runs and Overstreet knocked out five.

Collins Hill won its third straight title thanks to a gutty pitching performance from Kayla Floor. The senior won all four of her starts in the state tournament. Gordon Lee also repeated by taking out Wesleyan 6-1 in Class A.

Oconee County was back in the Class 3A title game after missing out the last three seasons and the Lady Warriors made up for lost time, edging West Laurens 2-0 for the crown. Finally Northgate needed extra innings but knocked off Whitewater 4-3 in eight to win the 4A title. Northgate also won the crown four years ago.

straight state title. The Wildcats placed all five of their point-scorers in the top 10 overall to win by more than 40 points over runner-up Lovett. Jordan Flowers of Westminster beat out Decatur's Joey Ronea by 34-hundreths of a second to capture top individual honors.

On the girls side, Westminster appears ready to win its third state championship in a row. The 'Cats lifted the region trophy by putting four runners in the top 10, including first-place finisher Sahara Fletcher with a time of 20:00.

Other metro Atlanta schools heading into the state meet with plenty of momentum after sweeping their region championships include Harrison (Region 4-5A) and Wesleyan (Region 5-A). The Hoya girls scored a mere 18 points while the boys edged Kennesaw Mountain 46 points to 48. The Wolves took both titles with ease and boasted individual champion Bradley Gossett.

All five classifications will hold their respective state championships on Saturday at Carrollton. Action will begin with the boys 2A race at 8:30 a.m. and end with the girls 4A competition at 3 p.m.

The Panthers had a great opportunity to continue to build momentum following the win over South Alabama but could not hold on losing in overtime to the Roadrun-

ners 17-14 after leading most of the game. Georgia State took a 14-0 lead in the second quarter on a 24-yard touchdown run by Donald Russell followed by a 56-yard touchdown pass play to Albert Wilson. For Russell, it was his ninth touchdown of the season. But UTSA kept chipping away in the fourth quarter and finally scored a touchdown and converted a 3-point conversion to get to within three at 14-11. Sean Ianno tied the game at 14-14 with a 39-yard field goal with only 24 seconds remaining in regulation. In overtime, after Georgia State missed its field goal attempt, Ianno came out and drilled a 39 yarder to give them the win. "UTSA is a good team, but this is a very disappointing loss because we just kept making mistakes and shooting ourselves in the foot," said Georgia State coach Bill Curry. "We've got to be able to run the ball when we need to, even if the other team knows we're going to run it, and we didn't get that done." It's also disappointing because it ensures that the Panthers can finish no better than 5-6 if they win their final three games. "This one definitely hurts because we had it in our grasp," said outside linebacker Jake Muasau, who finished with a game-high 10 tackles and an interception. "We have to learn from this and move on." Georgia State's next game is November 5th when they face NAIA St. Francis in the Georgia Dome. Kick-off at 2:00 p.m. ET (Listen on WCFO-AM 1160 and WMLB-AM 1690).

Ownership deal hits "significant" snag

When Los Angeles-based businessman Alex Meruelo agreed to purchase the Hawks from the Atlanta Spirit Group in August, he re-However, that was assuming the deal garnered approval from the NBA Board of Governors, who must approve all sales of teams before they can become official. Now, nearly three months after Meruelo and ASG came to terms, sources close to the situation claim the deal is by no means a sure thing. In fact, the Atlanta Journal Constitution reported last week that the deal has

hit a "significant snag."

Multiple sources, including the AJC and ESPN's Marc Stein, have reported that the Board of Governors, which must vote 75 percent in favor of the deal for it to go through, have recently raised concerns regarding whether Maryela has the finances to run the whether Meruelo has the finances to run the team. In fact, Stein reported that the collapse of the deal had been mentioned amongst the board when they met last week in New York

City to discuss the current NBA lockout.

Many initially pointed to the ongoing lockout as a reason for the slow movement of the process. But that may not be the case, as the sale of the Philadelphia 76ers was ap-

proved unanimously in October.

Still, Meruelo was full of assurances for Hawks fans and insisted that the deal will be

"I have more than ample resources to purchase and operate the Hawks in a first-class manner," he said in a statement released last week. "I am committed to the purchase of the Atlanta Hawks. While I can't comment on the details of the approval process, I have and will do everything I can to bring the process to a positive conclusion."



The last time Georgia beat both Florida and Tennessee in the same season was 1988, Vince Dooley's last as the Bulldogs' head coach.


