Atlanta market attractive for Sun Belt

t the recent Business of Sports Summit, At the recent Dusiness of Spots.

Georgia State athletics director Cheryl

Georgia Levick gave a few details behind Georgia State's decision to leave the CAA for the Sun Belt in 2013. She noted all of the benefits for Georgia State in terms of increased revenue and an easier travel schedule, but also said that Georgia State University was incredibly attractive for the Sun Belt. The conference has members in Denver, Miami and the outer reaches of Dallas (Denton), but the opportunity to move into Atlanta was what brought the Sun Belt to the table. Georgia State's football team will be eligible to move up to FBS for the 2013 season with postseason opportunities in 2014. "When we looked at (moving),

we did consider the city of Atlanta. It was a driving force," said Levik.

Georgia State's football and basketball programs have made big strides over the last calendar year. Ron Hunter took the basketball team to a postseason tournament after Bill Curry finished off a second football campaign. Both coaches took their respective Panthers to appearances on ESPN's family of networks, and with the Sun Belt being one of 11 FBS football conferences, opportunities for major television are sure to increase.

BASEBALL COVERAGE ...

The baseball season is back, and that means more radio wars by the two sports sta-

tions in town. 680 The Fan is the home of Braves baseball, so we will be beaten over the head with everything Braves from now until October. Braves closer Craig Kimbrel will make a weekly appearance on Buck & Kincade while Chuck & Chernoff will host their show from Turner Field each home game. Speaking of Chuck & Chernoff, the last 20-30 minutes of their show will be hijacked by Braves talk leading into the Braves pregame, which starts more than an hour from first pitch.

And in an effort to make you forget about the Braves, 790 The Zone will beat you over the head with football talk, football talk and MORE football talk. 790 The Zone is the home of the Falcons as well as Georgia Tech, but sometimes it would be okay to reference some baseball without the Mike Bell nerd accent. Just so you know, some people that are big football fans also enjoy baseball, too. Wasn't sure if you were aware.

National TV to feature Falcons 4 times

When you play 16 games in a season, every single one matters. This isn't Major League Baseball, where you go for 162 in a single year. Nor is this the NBA and NHL, where an 82-game slate is par for non-lockout campaigns. This is the NFL, and the importance of each contest is a big reason why the annual schedule release is treated with fanfare not seen by any other professional sport.

I SEE A PATTERN ...

Before we get to whom the Falcons play and when they play 'em, one thing jumps out about Atlanta's 2012 schedule: the Birds alternate road and home games the entire way. That's right; they go away, home, away, home, away, home, away, home, etc. from start to finish. I'm not sure that has happened before for any team ever. What I do know is that this year—not surprisingly—the Falcons are the only team that will alternate 100 percent of the time. It's basically the exact opposite of Sean Payton's 2012 itinerary, which goes bye, bye, etc. from Week 1 through Week 17.

The nation will get to watch Atlanta four times starting with a Week 2 Monday Night Football showdown in the Georgia Dome against Peyton Manning and the Denver Broncos. The other primetime home game will come against the Payton-less Saints on Thurs., Nov. 29 as the Falcons look to avenge

a pair of tough 2011 losses to their division rivals. Away dates on national television include a Sunday night trip to Dallas on Nov. 4 and the team's second appearance on "Monday" Night Football (a Saturday edition) on Dec. 22 against Detroit. That's an impressive amount of time in the limelight, especially for a team that underachieved last year and made little to no offseason noise.

With Manning and the revamped Broncos coming to town, you can be sure fans have already circled Sept.17 on their calendars. So, too, has wide receiver Roddy White. "Monday night football week 2 I'm loving it," White posted on Twitter shortly after the schedules were released on Tuesday.

We're all lovin' it. I mean, it's hard to complain about four primetime appearances, enticing home games (including a Dec. 16 date with the Super Bowl champs), a likely clash against Heisman winner RG3 (at Washington on Oct. 7) and another rematch with Michael Vick (this time in Philadelphia on Oct. 28). Now, if we could just get a few more wins than last season....

HOPE FOR HAWKS ...

As usual, the Hawks have flown under the radar all season long. NBA talk focuses on

whether or not Miami will finally get it done, if the Lakers and Spurs still have enough gas left in the tank, if Derek Rose can stay healthy, if the Knicks can win a playoff series (or two, or three, or four) and if the Thunder are the team to beat. That leaves no time to discuss a team as boring as the Hawks.

They may be boring (relative to, say, Lob City), but watch out for these Hawks. Atlanta has quietly compiled a 36-25 record and is in good shape for the No. 5 seed (tied with Orlando as of Wednesday but owns the tiebreaker and has an easier schedule). Sure, that is nothing more than the norm for the Hawks, but it's especially impressive that they have done it almost entirely without Al Horford. Although Horford and Zaza are hurt at the moment, both could be back for the playoffs with Horford having been recently cleared for contact.

Just as importantly, every other Eastern Conference squad has question marks. Rose is constantly injured, the Heat are inconsistent and facing a ton of playoff pressure, Indiana is...Indiana, and Boston is old. Are the Hawks great? Heavens no. But are they good enough to do some serious damage in the East playoffs? Absolutely.

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SMOLTZIE HONORED



Braves retire legendary pitcher's No. 29

always wanted to be clutch," said John Smoltz in a conference call.

For 20 seasons the Atlanta Braves seemingly could always turn to John Smoltz for a crucial playoff start or to close out an elimination game. Earlier this week Braves president John Schuerholz announced that the team will retire Smoltz's No. 29 in a ceremony on June 8, when he will also be inducted into the team's Hall of Fame.

Smoltz addressed the media after Schuerholz's announcement, taking time to give plenty of credit to his former teammates and managers. "I'm truly honored to be with the likes of some of those numbers on the wall (out in left field)."

Smoltz spent 21 years with Atlanta, going 210-147 over 20 seasons while also racking up 154 saves with the team. The 1996 Cy

Young award winner represented the Braves in eight trips to the All-Star game. He rang up 3,011 strikeouts with Atlanta while posting a 3.26 ERA. After returning from an injury during the latter part of the 2001 season, Smoltz went on to become of the game's most dominant closers, a position he would hold for three more seasons. He recorded a leaguehigh 55 saves in 2002. For his career he twice led the NL in wins (1996, 2006), strikeouts (1992, 1996), innings pitched (1996, 1997) and three times led the league in starts made (1992, 1997, 2006).

"John has contributed so much to Atlanta Braves history. Inducting him into our Hall of Fame and making sure no one else will ever wear his No. 29 are the most meaningful and significant ways we can honor John," Schuerholz said in a release

of the second-winningest pitcher in postseason history.

HISTORY OF 29 ...

After June 8, no one will ever wear No. 29 again for the Braves, but originally Smoltz wasn't even donning that number himself. When he first came to the Braves, he sported No. 57 under Chuck Tanner. Later it was switched out to the iconic 29. "I was just given No. 29. It wasn't a superstitious thing." Smoltz admitted that he tried to switch several times, trying to get a number that he could achieve in number of wins. "I had (29) forever, and it stuck."

Early on in 29's career he struggled some, especially the first half of 1991. "Struggle is not new to me. I used it as a stepping stool to the next level." After a 2-11 start to the year, Smoltz caught fire, as did the Braves. Smoltz won 12 of his next 14 decisions as Atlanta eventually made the World Series. "The poor start was one of the few times in life where I lost focus on what to do."

Smoltz credited Bobby Cox for sticking with him in the rotation and leaning on him, just a 24-year old at the time. "Bobby was the reason I made the choice to stay with Atlanta every time."

The right-hander said that every time his contract came up, he thought about playing for Cox and with the Braves, and he tried to work out a way to stay with the team.

FULL CIRCLE ...

"So many things happened to me and for the best," said Smoltz when looking back over his career. Smoltz is the only pitcher in Major League history that can boast 200-plus wins and 150-plus saves. He accomplished nearly all of those numbers with Atlanta, many of the wins coming alongside friends Tom Glavine and Greg Maddux.

"I've had some of the greatest teammates and the greatest manager in the game. I can't think of what life would have been like without those guys."

From 1991-1998 either Glavine, Smoltz or Maddux captured all of the Cy Young awards save for 1997. Those three helped Atlanta to five World Series appearances and the

1995 title. With all of those memories, how will Smoltz approach June 8?

"I won't know if it will be emotional until that day," said Smoltz. "I never really thought about big games until on the mound. Probably (it will be emotional), but it will be a lot of fun too."

The ceremony will take place in June as the Braves wanted as many alumni as possible to attend and Smoltz had to find a weekend he could make it when he didn't have a TBS game to call. Since his retirement, Smoltz has become one of the best color commentators and analysts in the business, working with Peachtree TV, TBS and MLB Network. He is also writing a book entitled "Starting and Closing: Perseverance, Faith and One More Year," which is due out this spring.

Recently Smoltz was inducted into the Georgia Hall of Fame, a real honor he said as he knows he will spend his life in the state of Georgia. Smoltz said that throughout his career he never took time to ponder the Hall of Fame, leaving that for teammates and fans. He will join several of those teammates in Glavine and Maddux on the number wall and in the Braves Hall of Fame. Perhaps another former teammate, Chipper Jones, too, will have his number up there in the near future.

For the time being, Smoltz will be the ninth Brave to have his number retired, joining Glavine (47), Maddux (31), Cox (6), Hank Aaron (44), Eddie Mathews (41), Dale Murphy (3) Phil Niekro (35) and Warren Spahn (21). The team also retired Jackie Robinson (42) as did all of Major League Baseball. Perhaps another party will be in order for Smoltz in 2014. Braves fans are keenly aware that in two years, he will be eligible for Major League Baseball's prestigious Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

For now, though, Braves fans will have the chance to head out to Turner Field June 8 to honor a man who took the ball anytime it was handed to him, regardless of the situation, and gave it his all. "That is what this is all about," said Smoltz of the chance for a proper sendoff. "I had such respect for all of (the Braves employees and fans). I have so many friends."

Shiloh under investigation over transfers

Under the GHSA BY-LAW 1.72 (c) "A student-athlete transferring from one member school to another shall be ruled ineligible for one year because of "undue influence" if it is proven that the player who played for a coach at a former GHSA school followed that coach when he/she moved to another GHSA school. (This is not applicable to dependent children of the coach.)" The by-law is included under the Recruiting/Undue Influence section of the Student Certification of Eligibility.

Transfers take place every year in Georgia high school sports, and while many are due to families legitimately moving for jobs or hardships, some cases draw the attention of the GHSA. The slippery slope that is transfer eligibility always seems to have one or two cases a year that perk up people's eyebrows, and recently a situation at Shiloh High School came to the forefront. Coach Brian Montgomery went 2-8 in his first season at Shiloh after coming to the Gwinnett program from North Atlanta. Following the season, Shiloh quarterback Wil Larimore wrote an article for the AJC, in which he admitted that he and several teammates were asked by Montgomery to transfer, a direct violation of By-Law 1.72 (c).

INVESTIGATION ONGOING ...

A GHSA spokesperson revealed that an investigation is ongoing but would not comment on it any further. GHSA executive director Dr. Ralph Swearngin will be handling the investigation according to the governing body, but he is out of town until Monday and unable to comment.

In recent cases involving eligibility/ transfer issues wins have been stripped by the player's new team. Once such instance was with the Milton boys basketball program this

past season. Three wins earned by the Eagles past season. Three wins earned by the Eagles were later forfeited, though Milton did win the 2011-12 Class AAAAA state title. Interestingly enough, Mann was ineligible for the championship game following an ejection during the playoffs. Shiloh could be stripped of its two wins from one year ago, though the GHSA would not comment on that possibility.

Montgomery has been moved by the Gwinnett County Public Schools to another position in the school system, and, according to spokeswoman Sloan Roach in a piece by

to spokeswoman Sloan Roach in a piece by the AJC, the district will be recommending his non-renewal to the Board of Education at its April 19 meeting. A message left for Roach was not returned at press deadline.

PROPER PROTOCOL ...
Not all transfers need investigating, however. In many cases, the transfer is legitimate and a player in eligible immediately. Lassiter head football coach Jep Irwin spoke with Score about how the process is supposed to play out. "A new student's family contacts the school administration to set up enrollment," said Irwin. "You have to be both eligible as a student as well as an athlete in order to play."

Irwin noted that the administration rereceives records verifying the student's history and it is also up to the family to ensure that all records are properly transferred and eligibility guidelines are followed. "We (myself and my coaches) don't initiate any contact what receiver because that would be a violation." soever because that would be a violation, said Irwin. The Lassiter coach attends several meetings a year where rules, such as one involving transfers, are explained in detail to

while Irwin did not want to comment on the Shiloh situation specifically, he did say that he hopes it can serve as a wake up call for all coaches. "You need to be aware of what's going on in your program."

Transfers can certainly be a sticky situation if the by-laws are not followed to the final detail. The GHSA will soon make a ruling on the Shiloh situation and it will be interesting.

akeside-DeKalb won its 17th DeKalb County championship Monday as sophomore Meg Stephens took the all-around title and four gold medals at Dunwoody. The win by the Vikings ended a three-year run by the Wildcats.

WNBA drafts, prepares for new season

The Atlanta Dream enter the 2012 WNBA season as one of the favorites to win the league championship. After winning back-to-back Eastern Conference titles, the team hopes for a third shot at a WNBA championship this year. A big part of the success has been the play of forward Angel McCoughtry. In last year's finals, McCoughtry set a championship series record of 38 points in Game 1 against Minnesota. Point guard Lindsey Harding was the best overall player last year. Harding led the team in assists with 5.9 per game in the playoffs, along with a 14.5 scoring average. Harding and McCoughtry will be looked at for offensive production again this season.

NEW ADDITION ...

The WNBA Draft was held on Monday and with the 14th overall pick, Atlanta chose

guard Tiffany Hayes out of the University of Connecticut. Hayes comes from a Connecticut program that has produced some of the greatest womens basketball players in the world. The 22-year-old is looking forward to joining a winning team with championship experience.

"I am very excited to join the Atlanta Dream," Hayes said. "They have reached the WNBA Finals the last two seasons and have a talented roster with a great player in Angel McCoughtry. Hopefully, I can be a complementary player and bring some versatility. I can't wait to come into training camp and do whatever they need me to do to make the team better."

Hayes comes to the Dream with a ton of accolades. She was part of two NCAA championship teams, the Huskies in 2009 and 2010. At Winter Haven High School in Florida, Hayes garnered All-State First-Team honors as well as being named a McDonald's All-American in 2008. In 2011 and 2012, the 5-foot-10 guard was named to the First-Team All-Big East team. Hayes averaged 14.8 points, 5.8 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 2.3 steals per game in her senior year last season. She ranked in the top 10 in the Big East in three-point and free-throw percentage, steals and scoring. Hayes should give Atlanta an extra boost off the bench and may even start depending on how well she plays early on. What is certain is that Atlanta picked up a steal at pick No. 14.

The Dream had a third-round selection as well, and with the 32nd overall pick Atlanta chose 6-foot-4 center Isabelle Yacoubou out of France. The only problem with taking Yacoubou is that she was ineligible to be drafted under WNBA rules. The rule states that an international player must be drafted in the year in which they turn 20. Yacoubou is 26. Yacoubou was not going to play this season anyway due to international commitments to the French national team. She could sign as a free agent next season, but for now, she will not play for the Atlanta Dream.

BALES RETIRES ...

Center Alison Bales has retired after four

seasons in the WNBA. Bales joined Atlanta midway through the inaugural season of 2008 and averaged a little over four points per game in her career. The 6-foot-7 center has decided to attend medical school to pursue her dream of being a physician.

"I want to thank everyone in the Atlanta Dream organization as well as the entire city of Atlanta for giving me some of the best memories of my career," said Bales. "While basketball will always be one of my passions I have decided that it is time to pursue my other goal. I will soon be applying to medical school in order to begin the exciting yet arduous process to become a physician."

SEASON SCHEDULE ...

The Dream will start the 2012 season with an exhibition game against Tulsa on May 5 at Philips Arena. The regular season will get underway two weeks later with an Eastern Conference Finals rematch with the Indiana Fever. The Dream won the series with the Fever 2-1 last year, so look for Indiana to come out with revenge in mind. After the road opener, Atlanta will return home for four games against New York, Chicago, Phoenix and the Fever again. The early group of home games should give the Dream a chance to start fast.

Local sports leaders speak at summit

Some of the biggest names in professional sports came together Friday as the Atlanta Business Chronicle and the Atlanta Sports Council produced the Second Annual Business of Sports Summit at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Atlanta. Nearly 450 people made their way to the summit to hear from the likes of Greg McGarity, John Schuerholz, Rich McKay and Mark Lazarus.

Atlanta Business Chronicle publisher Ed Baker emceed the festivities and opened up the morning by introducing each panel and keynote speaker. He noted that attendance had increased by 30 percent and by more than 100 guests from last year.

Dan Corso, the executive director of the Atlanta Sports Council, also spoke at the outset of the event. He remarked that the increase

in attendance was "a true expression of the development of sports marketing in the Atlanta area."

University of Georgia president Michael Adams introduced a brand new panel to the summit, the Sports 101 panel that touched on the business of college sports. "The financial impact of the business of sports is staggering," said Adams. "This is an incredibly large business, and its significance is substantial."

Athletics directors from the state's four major universities were on hand. Greg McGarity of UGA was joined by Cheryl Levick of Georgia State, Dan Radakovich of Georgia Tech and Kennesaw State's Vaughn Williams. McGarity touched on conference expansion while Levick was more than happy to give some of the details of Georgia State's recent decision to move to the Sun Belt conference.

Radakovich was quick to speak about how Georgia Tech is always looking for ways to utilize new technology. "Technology is driven by the market. Our patrons demand it."

Levick joined in on the technology discussion, saying that Georgia State also takes that seriously. "We have to be interactive with our fans, especially our students."

Abe Madkour, the Executive Editor of the SportsBusiness Journal, spoke next and he broke down what the SportsBusiness Journal is keeping an eye on in the sports business world. Some of the topics that are the most popular these days for the Journal include baseball, UFC, the sale of the Dodgers, the Olympics and potential ESPN challengers.

The University of Georgia's Dr. Jeff

The University of Georgia's Dr. Jeff Humphreys spoke on the economic growth in the state of Georgia and how the sports industry has impacted the economy. "There has been a two percent growth in Georgia sports jobs from 2005-2010," said Dr. Humphreys.

This may not seem like much, but Dr. Humphreys reminded the crowd that the overall state of Georgia had a six percent decline, so the number was actually quite impressive.

Fred Kalil moderated the "Franchise Factor" panel featuring representatives from the Braves, Dream, Hawks and Falcons. McKay and Schuerholz were joined by Dream CEO Pete Canalichio, Dream GM Marynell Meadors, Falcons CMO Jim Smith, Braves Executive VP of Sales and Marketing Derek Schiller, Hawks President Bob Williams and Hawks VP of Corporate Partnership and Business Development David Lee. The topics ranged from social media in the clubhouse to Atlanta as a sports city to who the execs look up to in other sports.

up to in other sports.

Chick-fil-A, UPS, Coca-Cola and Kia Motors all sent representatives for the Major League Marketing panel, and the summit was wrapped up by Madkour sitting down with Lazarus, the Chairman of NBC Sports. Lazarus touched on whether the NBC Sports channel can be a viable challenger to ESPN and what sports leagues NBC might be eyeing for future television contracts. He also spent a great deal of time discussing the 2012 Olympics in London, which will be the first Games that Lazarus has overseen as chairman. "The Olympics are one of the last communal events that takes place anymore," said Lazarus of the Olympics on NBC.

For those interested in the business side of sports, the summit was an invaluable resource. Those in the sports business were treated to alternate ideas of how to market their products and how some of the biggest names in the Georgia sports games approach their day-to-day business strategies.

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Panthers officially join Sun Belt

Another monumental moment in Georgia State athletics history occurred on April 9 as the school officially became part of the Sun Belt Conference. The school will be leaving the Colonial Athletic Conference to join the Sun Belt beginning in 2013, which allows it to compete at the FBS level in football, meaning opportunities to play in postseason bowl games and nationally-televised games.

GSU's Sun Belt debut will coincide with the school's 100-year anniversary, which is only fitting for one of the crowning moment's in the athletic program's history. The Sun Belt Conference is one of 11 conferences to play in the FBS, along with the Bowl Championship Series. Georgia State returns to a conference that it helped start in 1976 as one of six chartering members. After leaving the conference in 1981, GSU joined the Trans America Athletic Conference, which is now known as the Atlantic Sun Conference, and in 2005, the school moved to the CAA.

Another key aspect of the deal to move to the Sun Belt is the financial side, which, by being in an FBS conference, guarantees games and generates additional revenue with nationally-televised games. The change also alleviates the travel burden on the athletes,

coaches and fans as much of the Sun Belt is spread throughout the Southeast and Central regions of the country, with the furthest distance being in Denver, Colo. Georgia State football is coming off its second season under coach Bill Curry and will start a Sun Belt schedule in 2013 and be eligible for the post-season in 2014. The 2012 schedule includes a marquee matchup with the Tennessee Volunteers in Knoxville, which could be a precursor to more BCS conference schools adding Georgia State to their schedules with the FBS move now official.

PITCHER HONORED ...
Georgia State pitcher Ben Marshall was named Pitcher of the Week in the CAA for his strong performance against William & Mary this past Saturday. Marshall pitched a complete game one-hit shutout while striking out six batters. He currently leads the team with a 4-3 record and a 2.83 ERA. With just under 20 games remaining, the Panthers are in the middle of the pack of the conference standings at 7-8 and are looking to make a late push into the CAA Tournament.

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Fans await second-round selection

Next Friday night, Atlanta Falcons fans will get their first look at the centerpiece of the Falcons' 2012 NFL draft class. The draft ac-

Falcons' 2012 NFL draft class. The draft actually starts on Thursday night with the first round, but Falcons fans will have to hold their collective breath until the 55th overall pick (the 22nd pick of the second round).

There are several possibilities for the Falcons to supplement their roster for 2012 and beyond. It becomes quickly clear what general manager Thomas Dimitroff is looking to get out of the first pick by studying the methods of the Flowery Branch brain trust and looking at the Flowery Branch brain trust and looking at recent history of where NFL teams have found value in the mid-to-late second round.

First, owner Arthur Blank, Dimitroff and head coach Mike Smith made it clear that they

are focused on improving immediately and advancing in the playoffs this winter.

Second, these leaders decided the most second, these leaders decided the most effective way to improve would be by overhauling the coaching staff, more so than the field roster. See the addition of former NFL head coach Mike Nolan as defensive coordinator, the addition of a new offensive coordinator Dirk Koetter. Also, don't overlook the biring of new offensive line coach Pat Hill hiring of new offensive line coach Pat Hill, who has NFL coaching experience and won 112 games at Fresno State.

That said, the Falcons would like to go with an offensive lineman in the draft. Not a dominant left tackle because those will be gone by the 55th pick, but you can expect Dimitroff to call the name of a right tackle that – using the verbiage of draft "gurus" – projects to left tackle in the future, or a dominant guard that can push the pile in short-yardage situations.

Recent draft history backs up this logic. According to profootballreference.com, eight offensive liver as have been drafted in the 10.

offensive linemen have been drafted in the 10 spots at and around the 22nd pick in the second round over the last five years. Combined, those players could have possibly played in 432 regular season games. The group has actually started in 320 and played in 382 of those games. That's production.

The Falcons will select an impact lineman. Our guess is, if available, they'll choose 6-foot-5, 330-guard/tackle out of Iowa State Kelechi Osemele. Osmele is big enough to play both positions and played left tackle in college. He's also described as a smart player. speed at the top of the order to go along with his productive bat.


SOLID STARTERS ...
