ATLANTA'S SOCIAL MEDIA ...

At the recent Business of Sports Summit, I found Braves President John Schuerholz's response to an inquiry about social media interesting. In a moment of frankness, Schuerholz admitted that he wished it would vanish from Turner Field.

"We'd like to have social media banned in the clubhouse, especially a few hours before the game," said Schuerholz. "We have young men and that's how they are communicating, but these are grown men too."

This was interesting as several Braves are very active on Twitter, including Kris Medlen (@KrisMedlen54) and Peter Moylan, who have countless followers and offer witty insight to the life of a Major League ball player. Medlen retweets photos and comments during his spare time to his 22,000 followers while answering questions from some of his near 40,000 followers.

Score's Hawks beat writer Robby Kalland investigated how the Hawks use Twitter and found that the organization doesn't regulate social media, nor does it have any guidelines for the players' use, outside of the league-wide regulations set by the NBA.

Coach Larry Drew said of social media, "I don't use it. I know guys that do it, my kids do it. I don't know much about it. We don't do anything to monitor guys, the league has rules, but, no we don't (do anything extra)."

Kalland found out that the general feeling in the locker room is, for the most part, the use of social media is positive. About half of the Hawks have either a Facebook account or a Twitter account, but usage varies. Jeff Teague and Al Horford use Twitter to communicate what they're doing or thoughts on the team with their fans, but others, like All-Star Joe Johnson, use social media sparingly.

"I've got both (Facebook and Twitter), but I barely use either one of them," said Johnson. "I don't think it's a bad thing, man. I think it's a way to communicate and socialize with your fans around the world."

None of Atlanta's main tweeters are as notorious as self-professed Twittaholic Miami Marlins outfielder Logan Morrison. @ LoMoMarlins has been quite vocal on a number of topics throughout his time on Twitter, inspiring a Sports Illustrated piece on his behavior, and leading many to believe that last year's demotion to the minors was partly because of his Twitter habits.

Falcons, Braves taking big swings

On the surface, the Falcons' three days at the NFL Draft were entirely uneventful. One of three teams without a first-round pick, Atlanta was on the sidelines until making the No. 55 overall selection. Thomas Dimitroff and company started with a center from Wisconsin, Peter Konz, who will likely serve in a backup role for at least one season. He is the only player picked by Atlanta whom even relatively hardcore fans have probably ever heard of. Lamar Holmes, an offensive tackle from Southern Miss, was taken in the third round despite being projected to last until round six or seven. The Falcons did not pick again until No. 157 overall in the fifth round. The 2012 draft, however, should not be

overlooked nor forgotten by Atlanta fans. Julio Jones may have been selected in 2011, but the Falcons used this year's first-round pick to move up to No. 5 overall last season. They assumed—correctly—that this year's installment of the draft would feature a relatively weak player field and that a successful season in 2011 would result in a late first-round draft position. Atlanta would have been in slot No. 22, where the Browns snagged former Oklahoma State gunslinger Brandon Weeden to be their quarterback of the future (and present). In that place the Falcons could have had someone like offensive tackle Riley Reiff or pass-rushers such as Nick Perry or Whitney Mercilus. Good players? Yes. Julio Jones-

type players? Nope.

In the seventh round, this might as well have been the announcement: "With the 229th overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft, the Atlanta Falcons select Asante Samuel, defensive back, Central Florida." Of course, in reality the Philadelphia Eagles sent Samuel to the Falcons in a pre-draft trade then used the 229th pick to get Kansas State running back Bryce Brown. No, Samuel is not a 22-year-old rookie getting paid seventh-round money. He's 31 and in line for several million dollars from the Falcons (\$2.875 million against the cap this season) over the next three years. Still, getting a proven Pro Bowl cornerback and making an NFC rival eat a large chunk of his upcoming salary? Now that's what I'm talking about for a seventh-round pick!

BASHING BRAVES ...

The Braves are no strangers to leading the major leagues in fewest runs allowed, but leading the league in most runs scored? That's about as rare as the Atlanta Thrashers making the Stanley Cup playoffs. The 2012 Braves were once again expected to rely on pitching, but they were No. 1 in the bigs in runs until April 21 and No. 1 the National League until April 28. The Braves are still sixth in the ma-

jors and second in the NL behind St. Louis. Freddie Freeman and Brian McCann both have four homers while Michael Bourn and Jason Heyward are creating scoring opportunities with a combined 15 stolen bases. When the pitching gets going, watch out.

The bad news, though, is that Atlanta is a dismal 2-5 against the NL East as of Wednesday. A division that is expected to remain tight is currently separated by 2.5 games from the leader to the fourth-place team. In that kind of race, a 2-5 record against key rivals is not going to get it done.

It's getting ugly in the NBA, where players are dropping by the wayside due to suspension (Metta World Peace, Rajon Rondo), injury (Derek Rose and Iman Shumpert worst of all) and stupidity (Amare Stoudemire). The Hawks have certainly not been immune to the injury bug in this crowded, lockout-shortened season. Already without Al Horford and Zaza Pachulia, they lost Josh Smith to a sprained knee in Game 2. Atlanta was looking good after a convincing Game 1 win and a Rondo suspension, but 48 hours later everything had changed with the series heading back to Boston.

Hawks head to Boston with series tied

After two games in Atlanta, the first-round series is tied at one game apiece.

The Hawks dominated early in Game 1, but had to fight off a number of Celtics runs in the third and fourth quarter to pull out a 83-74 victory. Game 2 saw much of the same as the Hawks pulled ahead multiple times, including a game-high 11-point lead late in the third quarter. However, the Hawks were unable to hold onto the lead in the fourth quarter, allowing the Celtics to outscore them 26-14 in the final period on their way to an 87-80 road win.

The main area of concern for the Hawks and head coach Larry Drew has been execution in the fourth quarter.

"We have to be better just in executing," said Drew. "We've been too slow getting into our sets, didn't do things with pace. [Tuesday night] we played too slow and too methodi-

cally. Boston's a good halfcourt team, particularly in the fourth quarter and we fed right into their defense."

FADING LATE ...

Fourth quarter struggles have plagued the Hawks in all five meetings this season with the Celtics, including their two victories. In the first two games of the series, Atlanta has scored 32 points combined in the fourth quarter while the Celtics have scored 47 points. The Hawks know they have to improve in the fourth quarter, and for Marvin Williams it needs to start on the defensive end.

"Defensively we had a lot of breakdowns in transition [in Game 2]," said Williams. "They had a few fast-break points and it's normally not like us to give up that many fast-break points, so defensively is where we have to step up." The fourth-quarter lapses have been frustrating because the Hawks have shown the ability on a few occasions in this series, most notably the first quarter of Game 1, to play at a fast pace and really force the Celtics back on their heels. In that first quarter the Hawks jumped out to a 31-18 lead, aided by seven fast-break points. The Hawks controlled the glass with 13 boards, and moved the ball extremely well at the offensive end with seven assists in the quarter.

Though Williams placed an emphasis on the defensive struggles for the Hawks, the offensive performance in the final period has also been dismal. Unlike in that Game 1 first quarter, the Hawks' offense has not been moving the ball well, and has reverted back to old habits with a lot of isolation plays for Johnson and others. The lack of ball movement is exemplified by the fact that the Hawks only have one assist in each fourth quarter. They also are yet to get a fast-break point in the fourth quarter, which shows the lack of pace that Drew spoke on.

ROAD RAGE ...

For the Hawks to go on the road and reclaim home-court advantage, they will have to find a way to get some easy transition baskets and move the ball in the fourth quarter. The key player that can be the catalyst for the Hawks' offense and can help them pick up the pace is Jeff Teague.

Teague has played extremely well in both games, but has not been as explosive in the fourth quarter. Part of this has been because the Hawks have run a lot of isolation plays for Johnson and Josh Smith. However, with questions about Smith's availability due to a sprained left knee, Teague will need to take on a bigger role in the offense.

Teague's quickness and ability to penetrate the Celtics' defense has been on display in the first two games. He is tied with Johnson for second on the team in scoring, with 33 points in the first two games, only behind Smith's 38. The good play by Teague has gotten the notice of Celtics coach Doc Rivers, who is searching for answers to combat the quick Atlanta point guard.

"He's quick as lightning, we're trying to use our point guard to do so many things defensively, they have to guard him and get into help positions," Rivers said. "And with Teague when you get off of him and try to recover and he's attacking you with his speed, he's really hurting us. We have to go back to the film, because we haven't figured out how to stop him."

Teague's presence could be a factor if the Celtics have to stay at home on him and not double off on Atlanta's scorers, and if they do continue to use their point guards to help on defense, Teague will need to take advantage by knocking down open jumpers and using his quickness to penetrate into the lane. He will be the "X-Factor" that could allow the Hawks to steal a road win in Boston, but the task will only get more difficult as Rondo will be back after four days of rest due to his one-game suspension.

Not only can Teague be a major factor in the half-court sets, but he is crucial for Atlanta to get out in transition. The Hawks feed off Teague's energy and his knack for jumping passing lanes and pushing the ball on the fast-break. He was one of the league leaders this year in steals, averaging 1.61 steals per game, and many of those steals lead to fast-break opportunities.

With Josh Smith potentially being out for Game 3 with his knee injury, the Hawks will need guys like Teague to step into a more integral role in their offense. Smith's play has been great all year and that carried over into the first two games of the playoffs, but Drew maintains the confidence in his team to get the job done no matter the injury situation.

"Can we win the series? I think we can. I still think we have guys that are capable," Drew said, "Certainly we'll have to get big games from certain guys, but I have all the confidence in the world that if those guys [Al, Zaza and Josh] aren't there then we can still win."

For the Hawks to win this series they will need to win a game in Boston, a rarity in Hawks' playoff history. However, this team has fought through injuries all year and has had different guys step up into big roles at both ends of the floor. To get the job done in Boston they will look to their superstar, Joe Johnson, to step up his offensive game, but the key will be getting energy at both ends of the floor from Teague, the floor general.

Burgeoning programs look for first titles

During Championship Month, when the GSHA will award 49 state champions in 11 sports (baseball, boys and girls golf, boys and girls lacrosse, boys and girls soccer, boys and girls tennis, boys and girls track and field), there will be some schools looking to win their first state championships. For some, it would represent the first in school history, for others, the first in program history.

Banneker boys track and field, North Atlanta girls tennis and Peachtree Ridge girls tennis are three of those teams. But, unlike many other programs that have yet to break through, these three programs have a reasonable chance at taking home a trophy unfamiliar to their schools.

REPRESENTING THE CITY ...

Under the direction of first-year head coach Jorge Perez-Cisneros, a U.S. Marine Reservist, and assistant coach Peter Townes, the North Atlanta High girls' tennis team has had its most successful season possibly ever. The

No. 4 seed from Region 5 has worked extremely hard to make it all the way the quarterfinal round of the Class AAA girls' state tournament after defeating the second seed from Region 8, Gainesville, 3-2 Thursday. This is the farthest any girls' tennis team has advanced in school history and the Warriors are trying to become the first Atlanta public school to ever win a girls state tennis championship.

The Warriors' region is the most competitive region in all of Class AAA, according to Perez-Cisneros. Region 5 is stacked with two of its teams currently ranked top 10 in the state. The squad will be the underdog in a rematch with its region foe, St. Pius X, currently ranked No. 2 in the state, in the quarterfinal round. According to Perez-Cisneros, if North Atlanta can defeat St. Pius X, the state title becomes a real possibility.

TROJAN HORSES ... Banneker High School has never won a state title in any sport. But the boys track and

field team aims to change that. Ranked No. 1 in the ga milesplit.com Class AAAA power rankings, the Trojans look poised to make history at the southwest Atlanta school.

"It would be great for our school and our community," said head coach Juval Winston. "Our athletes are pretty excited, but I tell them to stay humble and to let their talent speak for itself on the track."

One thing Winston doesn't have to worry about is talent. While many successful teams in a variety of sports throughout the state supplement their rosters with players who transferred into the district just in time for — or midway through — high school, Banneker's roster is full of kids from the same neighborhoods. And they come into high school their freshmen years ready to contribute to the track and field team.

"Most of our kids went to Banneker middle schools," said Winston. "We welcome them with open arms to our program, but we tell them 'if you plan on working, we plan on coaching you."

While the state championship is the team's ultimate goal, Bolt doesn't let it consume her players' thoughts.

"It's something we've been striving for," said Bolt. "I'd be lying if I said it wasn't our goal. But if we don't win it, you can't say we haven't had a great season."

This season, the Lions (15-2) have lost only to Lambert, albeit twice, after losing just twice total in the past two seasons (both to Walton). Bolt admitted her team got a nice draw in the state tournament. Her Lions won't get No. 2 Roswell or eight-time defending champion Walton until the finals.

Bolt and her program at the Ridge have accomplished a lot in her seven years, and the last remaining goal is the state title. This year looks as promising as any, as Walton finally appears to be down.

Gwinnett County has 13 teams in the state playoffs this year and, while that includes last year's A, AA, and AAAAA state champions, no team enters the playoffs hotter than Brookwood. The Broncos have won their past seven games and are holding opponents to an average of a run per game over the

course of their winning streak. Lucas Sims, the team's ace, has played a large role in the team's success and stands a fair chance of being drafted in the first round of next month's 2012 MLB First-Year Player Draft.

The state baseball playoffs will begin Friday across the state as the top four teams from each region will compete in a64-team fields to determine champions for all five classifications.

In Class A, Hebron Christian will begin its title defense with a series against Region 7-A three-seed Glascock County. Meanwhile, Wesleyan, which won the 2009 and 2010 state titles, will face Region 6-A champion Mt. Paran in an interesting matchup involving metro Atlanta programs.

Defending Class AA champion Buford is the No. 2 seed out of Region 6 and will host Temple in a first-round series. The Wolves are trying to become the first repeat champion in the classification since Cartersville in 2001 and 2002.

Two-time defending Class AAAA champion again won Region 6, and will host Villa Rica in the first round. The War Eagles have won four of the past 10 state titles in Class AAAA.

In Class AAAAA, defending state champion Parkview will host Gwinnett County neighbor Collins Hill in the first round.

Atlanta heads into 2012 with big dreams

While the Atlanta Hawks are firmly entrenched in the NBA playoffs, the Atlanta Dream are preparing for their fifth WNBA season, which begins on May 19. The team is in the midst of training camp, which will feature a preseason game on Saturday against Tulsa. Atlanta is focused on vying for a third straight Eastern Conference title and first-ever WNBA title.

NEW ADDITIONS ...

Training camp started with a Nike Elite Girls Clinic at Norcross High School. Three new members were added to the squad and will have a chance to make the team over the next few weeks. Forward Chelsea Regins and Aishah Sutherland along with guard Brittany Johnson come to Atlanta with a lot of talent and accolades.

Regins should be familiar to local fans

after playing four years at Georgia Tech. The 6-foot-2 forward is versatile and can play on the block or on the wing. In 2011-12, she helped the Yellow Jackets to their best season ever by reaching the Sweet 16 in the NCAA tournament. As a junior and senior, Chelsea played in every game and started five last year. Regins completed her senior season by averaging 5.3 points and 4.1 rebounds per game. It will be tough for Regins to make the team and become a contributor, but she could help the Dream with her size down low.

Aishah Sutherland was one of the top players for the Kansas Jayhawks last year as she led them to a Sweet 16 appearance for the first time since 1998. Over four years at Kansas, Sutherland topped 1,000 points and 500 rebounds, becoming just the 15th player in program history to do so. Sutherland was

a key contributor to the Jayhawks throughout her college career. As a freshman, she averaged nearly a double-double (11.8 points, 9.2 rebounds) during five games of the NIT. As a sophomore, she ranked second on the team in rebounding, fourth in scoring and led the team in blocks. As a junior, she ranked second on the team with 41 blocks. The 6-foot-2 forward averaged 13.9 points and 9.1 rebounds per game as a senior. Sutherland was also a great defender in 2011-12, averaging over a steal and block per game. Look for Sutherland to push the veterans in training camp and possibly earn a spot off the bench.

Guard Brittany Johnson is one year removed from her college career at Ohio State. Johnson played in Greece last year with Panionios Athens and averaged 21.1 points per game. She started every game as a junior and senior for the Buckeyes. Johnson led Ohio State to three NCAA tournament appearances. The biggest attribute that the 5-foot-11 guard brings to the Dream is outside shooting. Johnson finished her college career as Ohio State's third all-time three-point shooter with 216 made from outside the arc. Last year, she shot 41.5 percent from outside, while playing in Greece. Johnson should learn from guard Lindsey Harding during camp and could challenge for a roster spot.

PRESEASON CAMP ...

Practices during training camp will give head coach Marynell Meadors a glimpse of the type of squad she expects to see this season. The real test will come when the Dream host Tulsa on Saturday at Philips Arena. The rookies and new players will have a chance to show their skills against real competition and that will show Meadors who should be on this team.

It will be interesting to see how draft pick Tiffany Hayes fares in her first taste of professional basketball. Hayes will get plenty of minutes and be able to display her dynamic game that brought so much success to the Connecticut Huskies. Hayes was an all-around player under Gino Auriemma, averaging double figures in points and posting 5.8 rebounds per game to go along with 3.3 assists and 2.3 steals per game.

The three free-agent signees, Regins, Sutherland and Johnson, will all have their share of playing time against Tulsa. Whether they make the team or not depends on how they perform in the exhibition contest. Tulsa has been one of the worst teams in the WNBA since relocating from Detroit back in 2010. Last year, the Shock had just three wins in 34 games. Despite the lack of competition, the preseason game should be a good tune-up for the Dream.

Georgia State football added another accomplishment to its brief history during the NFL Draft, as defensive lineman Christo

compilishment to its oriet history during the NFL Draft, as defensive lineman Christo Bilukidi became the first Panther to be selected. The 6-foot-5, 290-pound lineman was taken by the Oakland Raiders in the sixth round with the 189th overall pick.

Last season, Bilukidi tallied a team-high five sacks and nine tackles for loss to go along with his 38 tackles. The two-year starter finishes his GSU career with 10 career sacks. Bilukidi transferred to Georgia State from Eastern Arizona Junior College in 2010, just before the program's inaugural season.

The first NFL draftee in Georgia State football history comes on the heels of the announcement of GSU's admission into the Sun Belt Conference of the FBS, which opens the doors for more national exposure and postseason bowl eligibility. With the pick of Bilukidi, the Raiders are looking to bolster a defensive line that struggled throughout the season and finished amongst the NFL's worst in all major defensive categories.

linebacker Jake Muasau has been invited to attend the New York Giants rookie camp, which begins next week. Muasau was an integral part of the Panther defense in his two-year career, bringing high energy and playmaking skills to the field. He racked up 106 tackles, three interceptions, four forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries in his career.

PANTHER SOFTBALL ...

Entering the final series with an impressive 34-15 record, which includes a shocking upset of second-ranked Alabama, the Georgia State softball team is set to defend its conference championship in the CAA Tournament, which begins May 9. The Panthers will have their hands full against top-seeded Hofstra, which is perfect in conference play entering the final series of the regular season. GSU was able to take out the Pride in last year's conference tournament, sweeping them in the final series. The team will once again look to reach the Women's College World Series, where last season they had the tall order of facing the Georgia Bulldogs, who were ranked sixth at the time, and the Florida State Seminoles.

The official report on the injury is a strained tendon in his left knee and his status is day-to-day. Teague has had 33 points, 11 rebounds and four steals thus far

in the series, and has played with high energy and quickness.

Atlanta has yet to get a typical performance from Joe Johnson, who has struggled to get into his offensive rhythm that the Hawks have become accustomed to. Joe has gone 10-for-32 from the field, and 3-for-17 from three-point range in the first two games. His struggles were magnified in Game 2 as his counterpart Paul Pierce went off for 36 points and 14 rebounds. For Atlanta to win, especially if Smith is limited or even out, Johnson will need to return to top form and play better down the stretch in lategame situations. Hawks fans have become accustomed to Johnson making clutch baskets, but so far he, like the rest of the Hawks, has struggled in the fourth quarter.

Atlanta will need to play with pace and energy in order to win a game in Boston and reclaim home-court advantage. That will have to start in the backcourt, with Teague and Johnson. The Hawks have a tough task in front of them, but they have fought through injuries all season.

Falcons acquire six draftees, Samuel

The Falcons made six selections in last week's NFL Draft, starting with Wisconsin offensive lineman Peter Konz at No. 55 overall in the second round. Konz mostly lined up at center for the Badgers and he could back up Todd McClure this season in Atlanta or con-

tend for a starting guard spot.
"Just getting the opportunity is amazing,"
Konz said in a conference call with the media on draft day. "It doesn't matter where I fell to because I love the team that picked me. I have nothing but great respect for the organization. Now I get to help be part of a winning tradition.... When the Falcons were in the Super Bowl (1998 season), I was doing the 'Dirty Bird' with the rest of them."

Atlanta rounded out its draft with offensive tackle Lamar Holmes (third round), fullback Bradie Ewing (fifth), defensive end Jonathan Massaquoi (fifth), safety Charles Mitchell (sixth) and defensive tackle Travian Robertson (seventh). Holmes played left tackle at Southern Miss while Ewing was a teammate of Konz's at Wisconsin. Massaquoi is cousins with former University of Georgia receiver Mohamed Massaquoi (currently with the Cleveland Browns) and former Vikings tight end Visanthe Shiancoe (currently a free agent).

ENTER PICK 6 ... Of course, the Falcons did a lot more with their 2012 draft than the simple selection of six new players. It started at last year's proceedings, when Atlanta sent its 2012 firstround pick to snag wide receiver Julio Jones at No. 5 overall. It also included a shrewd move to acquire veteran cornerback Asante Samuel from the Eagles in a trade with Philadelphia last Wednesday (the Eagles received Atlanta's seventh-round pick). Samuel is four-time Pro Bowler and he won Super Bowls with New England in 2003 and 2004. He has 45 career interceptions, five of which he returned for touchdowns

Samuel posted the following on Twitter shortly after being dealt: "Falcon Nation it is show time. Pick 6 is on the job". He also spoke with AtlantaFalcons.com in a Q&A

spoke with Atlanta alcons.com in a Q&A earlier this week.

"I think the most I bring is knowing how to win, expressing winning and how important it is to win," Samuel explained. "I think it's all the things I went through when we were winning that I learned and saw. I bring the confidence of a winner."

Phillies still a nemesis for Braves

The Braves played their first of 17 regular-season games against the Phillies on Tues-day at Turner Field and the result was no different from what transpired throughout much of 2011. Atlanta erased a 2-0 deficit to tie the game, but Philadelphia rocked Jonny Venters for four hits and two runs in the eighth inning to secure a 4-2 victory.

"We were all set up to win that ballgame and it kind of hurts," manager Fredi Gonza-lez told the AJC afterward. "It wasn't Jonny's day. A couple balls got through the infield it seemed like all night...a couple balls off the end of the bat or going through that hole there. But it's just one of those days. I'm really pleased the way we swung the bats early in the game. It just wasn't our night.

Dating back to last year, the Braves have now lost eight consecutive games to the Phillies—including a season-ending sweep to knock Atlanta out of postseason contention. The Braves have not scored more than three runs in any of the last 10 nine-inning games against Philadelphia (they won an 11-inning contest 4-1 on July 9 of last season and have not defeated Philly since). This week's two-game set wrapped up on Wednesday with a showdown between Tommy Hanson and Roy Halladay (results not available at press time).

BOURN SUPREMACY ...

Atlanta finished fourth to last in the major leagues in stolen bases last season. Michael Bourn led the majors with 61 thefts, but he was not acquired until a trade-deadline deal with Houston. Bourn is off to a strong start to what will presumably be his first full season with the Braves. Through 100 at-bats he is hitting .330, tops on the team by far among full-time starters. He is tied for seventh in the majors with seven steals, one fewer than the surprising Jason Heyward. Thanks to the fleet feet of Bourn and Heyward, a normally hesitant Atlanta squad is

Heyward, a normally nesitant Atlanta squad is seventh in the bigs with 18 swipes.

"He's been solid," Gonzalez said of Bourn. "That's what he does. Now we need to get him to drive in some runs; hit some home runs. Am I asking for too much?"

Answer: no. In a loaded NL East and in the

midst of the aforementioned skid against Philadelphia, the Braves need all of this and maybe even more from Bourn if they want a division title.


