Local newspaper not holding back

One thing that radio talking heads in our fair city joke about constantly is the lack of accountability the AJC holds the professional franchises to on a regular basis. Despite years of coming up short of a second World Series title, the AJC never took a swipe at Bobby Cox as radio personalities such as 790 The Zone's Mike Bell did. Despite early postseason exits, the paper never took the Falcons or the Hawks to task.

That has seemingly changed over the last few weeks. After the Hawks were bounced from the playoffs and the ownership decided to bring back Larry Drew, the new AJC hatchet-man Mark Bradley bemoaned keeping Drew with a story that said "in light of this offseason's first big move, there's no reason to hold out hope. We've again been reminded that these are the Atlanta Hawks."

Bradley then moved his target upon the Atlanta Braves and the team's recent eight-game losing streak. The team had struggled since sitting atop the NL East as recently as two weeks ago, and Bradley jumped at the chance to turn the heat up on the Turner Field tenants.

"The team that believed it had great starting pitching doesn't have very good starting pitching," said Bradley in his piece.

Of course he backed up his blog's bold proclamation with numbers and statistics, but he neglected to point out that the team's skid coincided with a Brian McCann illness. The loss of a starting catcher will affect any pitching rotation.

Bradley wasn't the only writer ripping the Braves. Jeff Schultz took a swing at the team, asking if the team could manage a "little less slapstick" in order to improve. Schultz was a little more forgiving in allowing for injuries, but his headline also noted that the Braves were suddenly lacking a clue.

In most other cities the professional franchises are held accountable for their actions, and it is nice to see Atlanta trying to catch up with the Bostons, Chicagos, Philadelphias and New Yorks. It is just going to be startling to see the transformation of our OTHER local paper in the process.

No panic necessary for Braves and Hawks

A nother familiar scenario has unfolded once again in Atlanta. The Hawks have been handed another early playoff exit and the Braves are struggling after another promising start. While it remains hard to be optimistic as the playoff failures continue, it should be noted that neither team seems to be regressing despite not being able to take that next step into their respective league's elite. As we look toward the remainder of the 2012 season for the Braves and next season for the Hawks, there is still reason to believe that both of these teams can remain competitive for years to come without any major changes to be made.

WHAT GOES UP ...

After a fast start to the season, the Braves

have fallen on hard times. A multitude of injuries to players like Freddie Freeman, (dry eye), Brian McCann, (flu-like virus) and Chipper Jones, who is on the disabled list after a ground ball injured his leg on May 18, have seemingly disrupted a team that many thought could remain atop the National League standings until October. Still, we are still early in the season and this could simply be a bump in the road in a very long season

be a bump in the road in a very long season. Every team in the NL East has its question marks. The Nationals, who are currently enjoying their place at the top of division, lack the experience factor. With young players such as Bryce Harper and Stephen Strasburg, the future in Washington is bright, but are they ready for the big stage? Last year's division champion, the Phillies, are currently floundering at the bottom of the division with decimating injuries to several key players such as Roy Halladay, Cliff Lee, Ryan Howard, and Chase Utley. There may not be enough time in the season for Philadelphia to return to its 2011 dominance.

While the Braves do have questions surrounding their rotation, with Tim Hudson slowly recovering from back surgery and Tommy Hanson struggling to find consisten-cy, both guys have the ability to regain their form in order to keep the Braves in conten-tion. Combine them with MLB ERA-leader, Brandon Beachy, and the rotation remains formidable. Injuries to the lineup remain a concern, but when it's at full strength, the team thrives and the bats are on. Michael Bourn has consistently remained one of the game's best leadoff hitters, Martin Prado is enjoying a renaissance year and Jason Heyward seems to be regaining his 2010 form. Atlanta fans must remember that this is a sprint, not a marathon, and that, when healthy, the Braves can consistently be the team that started out this 2012 season scorching hot.

BUILD AROUND AL ...

Regardless of what anyone will tell you, Al Horford is the backbone of the Atlanta Hawks. Yes, the Hawks made the playoffs and had home-court in the playoffs, but imagine where the team would have been if Horford had remained healthy. We could have been looking at a possible third-seed for the Hawks, which, this year, would have meant a first-round matchup with a depleted Orlando Magic squad. For the Hawks to take that next step, Al

For the Hawks to take that next step, Al needs to move to his natural position, power forward, and the team needs to work to find a legitimate center so that Al can be most effective at the four-spot of the lineup. Zaza Pachulia and Jason Collins have been serviceable to the lineup for years but in order to compete with the NBA's best frontlines, an upgrade is necessary. The Hawks are certainly strapped for cash, so in order to add a formidable replacement, the dreaded amnesty clause may need to be used and the most-likely candidate would have to be Marvin Williams.

While many would call for Joe Johnson to be the amnesty casualty, that seems improbable due to his stature within the franchise. If Williams is amnestied, the Hawks would have roughly eight million to spend on an upgrade at the center position and, along with the mid-level exception, can upgrade the team's enough to not only keep the team in contention, but to compete at the upper-echelon of the Eastern Conference.

Atlanta in tailspin after fast start

What a difference eight days makes. When Atlanta left Tampa Bay to head north to Cincinnati on May 20, the Braves had just taken two of three from one of the American League's best teams in a building where visitors rarely find success. The Braves were winners of three of their previous four with just a four-game series against the Reds blocking an extended home stand.

The Reds, however, swept the four-game set with the Braves, and then the Nationals took three straight from Atlanta in Turner Field. St. Louis ensured it was a bad Memorial Day by taking out Tommy Hanson and the rest of the pitching staff 8-2 this past Monday.

What has happened to the Braves to go from first place in the NL East with a 1.5game lead to dead last in the NL East in a stretch of just eight days? How did things turn so quickly that Braves fans feel like they are drinking expired milk whenever the home team takes the field? Unfortunately, there is no short answer to solve the riddle that is an eight-game losing streak.

PITCHING WOES ...

Many people looked at the Atlanta rotation entering the season and thought this would carry the team all the way to the postseason. The rotation had former all-stars Tim Hudson and Jair Jurrjens headlining with Hanson backing them up as a strong No. 3. Brandon Beachy tasted some success last year and Mike Minor looked sharp throughout all of spring training. The fans were even excited about Randall Delgado, who was pitching like he didn't want to call Gwinnett home ever again.

The script was quickly rewritten and not for the better.

Jurrjens was demoted to Class AAA-Gwinnett after posting an 0-2 record with a 9.37 ERA in four starts. He was roughed up repeated in his starts and averaged four innings per appearance. Opponents were crushing the 2011 all-star to the tune of a .411 batting average and 17 runs in just 16.1 innings of work.

Jurrjens wasn't the only culprit though. Mike Minor has gone 2-4 in 10 starts with a 6.98 ERA. Minor has surrendered 13 home runs in his 58 innings of work this year.

Even Hanson hasn't been his dominating self this year. He leads the team with five wins, but he was shelled on Memorial Day and has four losses to go with his five wins.

Beachy and Hudson have been the bright spots for the rotation this year as Hudson has won half of his starts while Beachy has five wins. But both have lost during this losing streak as neither has gotten much help in terms of run support. Beachy has also seen his league-best ERA increase from 1.33 to 1.77 after giving up three home runs against Cincinnati. Hudson, meanwhile, gave up seven runs in a loss to Washington.

The bullpen has also struggled after appearing to be a strength entering the year. While 2011 NL Rookie of the Year Craig Kimbrel has converted 14-of-15 save opportunities, Jonny Venters has struggled to find the strike zone. The filthy left-handed set-up man has appeared in 21 games, but has been shelled for a .329 average and a 1.85 WHIP. Venters has surrendered nine walks and 25 hits in his 18.1 innings of work. Chad Durbin has earned the ire of Braves fans by posting a 5.60 ERA in 17.2 innings of work over 22 appearances. Durbin has allowed 11 runs this year, surpassed by Livan Hernandez's 12 earned runs and .303 average in 29.1 innings of work. Hernandez has given up 33 hits. Cristhian Martinez is also struggling with a 4.05 ERA.

INJURY BUG ...

It would be easy to point the finger at the injury bug that has bitten the Braves hard of late, but that is no excuse as every team experiences injuries throughout a 162-game schedule. The injuries have all come at once for Atlanta, though it seems. Chipper Jones was the first to go down for an extended period of time after taking a line drive off of his ankle. Jones had been missing games due to travel and a balky knee, but the ankle injury recently required surgery to help alleviate the pain for Jones. The team is 19-5 with Jones in the lineup this season. Freddie Freeman also was relegated to the bench after suffering corneal abrasions during the Colorado series. He has been suffering from blurred vision and dry eyes. When he has played, Freeman has struggled, going 1-for-17 with six strikeouts during the losing streak. Freeman is awaiting prescription goggles before his full-time return to the lineup.

Brian McCann has also been under the weather, missing six games in the process. He returned to the lineup Monday after backup David Ross was forced out due to an injured groin.

The injuries all mounted at once, and with so many regulars on the bench with various ailments, the deep bench that general manager Frank Wren put together was suddenly sapped with backups forced into regular action. Eric Hinske has spent time in the outfield and at first base during the losing skid, though he is hitting just .246 this season.

MOVING FORWARD ...

So what happens now? How do the Braves shake this funk they sit in and once again challenge for a spot in the postseason? One thing to remember is that the Braves sit just four games out of first place. The team has struggled at home this season, but how often do you see a team consistently tank at home throughout the course of a season? The team has a nine-game homestand approaching the week of June 10, so perhaps the Braves can start winning again on that extended stretch.

Despite the recent cold spell, the Braves still have a positive run differential, which cannot be said about two teams that currently sit ahead of the Braves in the NL East standings.

The offense should receive a boost now that McCann has returned to the lineup. Mc-Cann is a six-time all-star that also won the last four Silver Slugger awards for National League catchers and five of the last six. Assuming Freeman finally receives his prescription goggles, the Braves first baseman will look to return to his pre-condition form when he was hammering balls out of the park and registering a .303 batting average.

The onus is on manager Fredi Gonzalez to weather the storm and ride out this rough patch. If Gonzalez can keep the staff cobbled together until the offense returns to full strength, perhaps the Braves can still be within striking distance of a playoff berth come September.


Tech Baseball

Directors Cups handed out in three classes

It's the end of another competitive year of Georgia high school sports and that means it's time to crown our state's top athletic programs. The Regions Directors Cup is a marathon of state titles, combining the success of each sport for the whole school year to decide the winner in each class: A-AAAAA. Since the cup's creation in the 1999-2000 school year, we have seen Georgia's high schools battle it out for the right to call themselves powerhouses. There are 25 GHSA sports that count in

There are 25 GHSA sports that count in the standings each school year. Each school's eight-highest scoring sports for each gender are counted in the Regions Directors Cup standings. The sports that have under the minimum of 65 schools participating receive half points. After the year ends there is a boys, girls and an overall winner for each class based on these points. In a state bursting with talent and athleticism, the Directors Cup has become the flagship for school-wide athletic brilliance and achievement.

In AAAAA, Brookwood took its second straight overall title. The Walton boys finished second behind the Broncos and the Walton girls won the AAAAA cup over Brookwood in part due to their state championships in girls cross country, track and volleyball. The Brookwood boys cross country and track won state championships and, ultimately, Brookwood's 1242.5 total points edged out Walton's 1189.5 overall points total. In 13 years, Brookwood and Walton have combined for eight Directors cups, with Walton owning five of them. The two schools have also won five of the past six cups.

The 2012-2013 school year will start off with the two Class AAAAA athletic power-

houses facing off on the gridiron. Walton, which received 90 points for being the state runner-up in football this past year, will face the Brookwood Broncos Aug. 25 in the late game of the 2012 Corky Kell Kickoff Classic at the Georgia Dome. The Broncos beat the Raiders 27-10 in 2010 when they last matched up in the event.

The 2011-12 school year presented Marist with a 12th straight overall title. In Class AAAA Marist finished first overall, first in boys, and second in girls over Johns Creek which was second overall. Marist won state titles in boys golf and girls cross country, and pooled with their consistent winning sport-tosport, they are on top once again.

sport, they are on top once again. St. Pius X. which had won the Class AAA overall Directors Cup the past three years, was beaten by Woodward Academy which claimed its first Directors Cup. Only 52.5 points separated the two schools in the end, but state championships by Woodward Academy in boys tennis and boys soccer contributed valuable points towards the Atlanta private school's first title.

NOT DONE YET ...

Eleven-time overall Directors Cup winner Westminster holds a commanding lead over Blessed Trinity for the Class AA overall title, and Wesleyan leads the standings in the A overall title race over Darlington. Westminster's girls cross country and swimming as well as the boys cross country, tennis and soccer have contributed to and built the Wildcats' lead.

The boys cross country and swimming as well as the girls basketball team at Class A Wesleyan has built its lead in the standings over Darlington and have the Wolves looking for their fourth straight overall title. The Class A and AA baseball state champions

The Class A and AA baseball state champions were not completed at press deadline, so the Directors Cup points will not be finalized until then. The competition created by the Regions Di-

The competition created by the Regions Directors Cup has advanced Georgia's high school athletics since its beginning and continues to grow just as as the high schools and talent do.

Parkview defends Class AAAAA title

It was an all-Gwinnett final four in the Class AAAAA semifinal round as Parkview faced Mill Creek and Brookwood tangled with Grayson. The Panthers swept Mill Creek to advance to the finals, but Brookwood required a Game 3.

In the finals, Parkview defended its Class AAAAA baseball championship with a twogame sweep over Brookwood. Matt Olson tossed a complete game in Game 1, allowing just two unearned runs on five hits. He provided a spark at the plate, crushing a two-run home run. Ryan Blanton provided two hits and an RBI.

Lucas Sims threw a complete game for Brookwood, giving up three earned runs on seven hits with seven strikeouts. In Game 2 Sims knocked a home run early for the Broncos, but A.J. Davis blasted a two-run shot in the fourth to give Parkview the lead. The Broncos rallied with three straight doubles to tie up the game in the sixth, only to see Parkview recapture the lead with three in the top of the seventh. Olson finished the day with three RBIs and two home runs as well as the victory from Game 1.

LOGANVILLE LONG BALL ...

Loganville took advantage of the long ball to capture the Class AAAA baseball championship. David Mayo blasted a fifth-inning, three-run home run to help the Red Devils rally to take Game 1 of the best-of-three series. Loganville fell in the second game despite two more deep balls from Clint Frazier as Greenbrier bashed four homers.

In the rubber match, Loganville clubbed three more home runs. Mayo struck again as did Garrett Ford and Brandon Moncrief. The two-run home run off of the bat of Moncrief ended the series as Loganville won 14-4 via the mercy rule.

HISTORY REWRITTEN ...

At press deadline, the Class A baseball championship series had not yet begun, once the series began, Providence Christian's Christin Stewart had a chance to pad his new Georgia career home run record. In the semifinal round, Stewart blasted home run No. 69 to tie Gainesville legend Micah Owings' career mark. If Stewart, who signed with Tennessee, leaves the yard once more, he would own the all-time mark. The mark could be short-lived, however, as Loganville's Frazier has 45 entering his senior year and could pass Stewart with another season like his junior year, when he hit 23 home runs.

2013 OUTLOOK ...

The 2012 GHSA baseball season was loaded with superstar talent like few we have ever seen before. Players such as Appling County's Byron Buxton, Columbus' Kyle Carter and J.T. Phillips and Brookwood's Sims headlined a senior class that could have as many as six players taken in the first round of the MLB draft this June. Buxton, named the Georgia Gatorade Player of the Year, could be the first overall pick in the draft.

What will next year hold for high school baseball in the state of Georgia? Who will be the stars and the teams that warrant following? Grayson could be right back in the thick of the championship hunt as Austin Meadows enters his senior season. The outfielder stands 6-foot-3 and is ranked by ESPNHS as the top outfield prospect in the Class of 2013. He is No. 2 on the ESPN Super 60 and has committed to Clemson. Grayson had 14 juniors on this year's team that reached the Class AAAAA semifinals. Taylor Burnett could also make some noise as a rising junior.

Parkview will lose Matt Olson, but the return of Ryan Blanton and Josh Hart could keep the Panthers in the conversation for a three-peat. Fellow Gwinnettian Logan Moseley is one to keep an eye on as well. The Mill Creek rising junior is a shortstop with plenty of potential.

Redan's Wesley Jones is the No. 31 player on the ESPN Super 60 list, and the shortstop is one of three players committed to the University of Georgia, joining Loganville's Frazier and Walton's Stephen Wrenn, an outfielder. Alpharetta's Connor Jones is also a part of the UGA signing class. Jones is ranked by ESPNHS as the No. 21 pitching prospect in the country.

Marist missed out on the Class AAAA crown this year, but could be in the hunt for another title next year with Anthony Sherlag behind the plate for the War Eagles. Sherlag stands 6-foot-3 and is listed as the No. 8 catcher in the country by ESPNHS.

Metro Atlanta dominates finals

In the GHSA soccer finals, eight out of the 10 victorious teams were from metro Atlanta. The girls champions included GAC, Allatoona and Milton from the metro area while Collins Hill, Lambert, Woodward Academy and Westminster claimed titles on the boys side.

Northview and Milton met in the Class AAAAA girls soccer championship game. Milton finished with three goals in the final 17 minutes to take out Northview 4-0. The title was the first for the program and Milton's sixth state championship for the 2011-2012 school year. In the Class AAAAA boys soccer championship game, Collins Hill beat Centennial 3-1 for the school's third title in four years. Amiri Abraham scored the gamewinning goal and Emmanuel Raji added an insurance goal with 18 minutes remaining. This was Collins Hill's fifth consecutive appearance in the state final.

McIntosh defeated Whitewater 5-4 in PKs

after a 1-1 tie in regulation to win the Class AAAA girls soccer championship. Whitewater came into the game with high hopes after an unbeaten season, but after a nerve-racking contest, McIntosh was able to get its second championship. McIntosh was defeated by the Lady Wildcats twice in the regular season, 2-0 on Apr. 24 and 3-1 on Mar. 9. Bakawsu Kinteh scored four to help Lambert claim the Class AAAA boys state championship. It was the first state championship in just Lambert's third year of play.

TWO TAKES IT ...

Allatoona beat Columbus 2-1, claiming the first girls Class AAA title in program history. Willough Davis found the netting with 31:35 remaining to break a scoreless tie. Kristy Wise added what would be the winning margin with a goal 13 minutes later.

Woodward Academy outlasted Gaines-

ville 2-0 in the Class AAA boys soccer championship game. War Eagles goalkeeper Alex Robinson came up with seven saves in the second half to lead his team to victory. Cameron Moseley scored both goals for Woodward Academy.

CLOSE CALLS ...

Greater Atlanta Christian defeated Blessed Trinity 1-0 in the Class AA girls championship game. Spartan freshman Danielle Marcano scored the only goal six minutes into the first half.

Westminster edged Blessed Trinity in PKs after the two teams ended overtime tied 1-1. Wildcat goalkeeper Andrew Freschi won the game with two key saves to help win the Class AA boys soccer championship game.



McGrady, Johnson, Willie Green and Jannero Pargo each played well enough to deserve another contract for next season. Jason Collins is likely to receive yet another deal to keep a warm body on the bench to provide an emergency option behind Al Horford and Pachulia. The team could also add bodies during the NBA draft as the team will select once in the first round with the No. 23 pick and once in the second round with the No. 43 pick from Phoenix. The team traded its No. 52 pick to Golden State.



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
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
