Slain player leads the headlines

Sadly, the top story on Twitter and newspapers across the state over the weekend wasn't a positive one as word came down that former Lowndes offensive lineman Ed Christian was shot and killed in Alabama. The 2009 AJC Super 11 standout signed with Auburn out of high school, but was killed after he tried to intervene during a disagreement that led to the deaths of three people. Papers from Columbus to Valdosta to Gainesville carried the story.

I remember calling a 2009 game at Mc-Connell-Talbert Stadium between the Vikings of Lowndes and the Northside-Warner Robins Eagles. Though Christian's team lost, I spoke with some of the members of the Lowndes radio team about Christian, who had just decommitted from Florida State. The radio crew and coaches had nothing but positive words to say about him. Just three days later, Scott Janovitz and I had him on The Official Visit on 790 The Zone to talk about his decision to de-commit from FSU. At the time he told us he liked Auburn, where he would eventually sign. Christian redshirted at Auburn during the 2010 season before injuries forced him to retire from the game of football.

So many times people lose track of these names and faces once National Signing Day passes, especially if some of these athletes go to a different school or drop off the radar. Christian was one of the athletes that I would imagine many forgot about after he was forced to retire from football due to injuries.

Hopefully, this tragedy opens some eyes that these high school athletes are not merely slabs of meat to be divvied up by the nation's top recruiters each February. Perhaps fans on message boards will also take it easy on kids that don't go to their school or that do and fail to live up to unreal expectations. I credit Christian for continuing to stay at Auburn to pursue a degree despite a medical disqualification. He was living up to the student portion of student-athlete, and if the reports of his trying to break up the confrontation were true, then he should be viewed as a tragic hero.

Venezuelans in Major League Baseball

Pabianna Blanco grew up in Venezuela before coming to America in 2008 to attend the University of Oregon. She is currently enrolled at the University of North Texas, where she will graduate this December with a broadcast journalism degree from the Mayborn School of Journalism. Here is her story on baseball, which is a big deal in her homeland.

baseball, which is a big deal in her homeland.

Baseball has been Venezuela's most popular sport dating back to the early 20th century.

Since 1939, 273 baseball players from Venezuela have played in Major League Baseball.

Venezuela has its own professional baseball league, called Venezuelan Professional Baseball League (VPBL), which is a winter league established in 1945. Los Leones del Caracas is the most successful team, with Valencia's Navengantes del Magallanes a close second. Every time these two teams play, Venezuelan baseball stadiums get so crowded, there are people waiting outside of the gates just to listen to the game.

One of the most recognized Venezuelans to play in America is Ozzie Guillén. During his career, Guillén played shortstop for the White Sox (1985–97), Baltimore Orioles (1998), Atlanta Braves (1998–1999) and Tampa Bay Devil Rays (2000). After his playing days, he managed the Chicago White Sox to the 2005 World Series title before leaving Chicago for the Miami Marlins this season.

The Luis Aparicio Award was established

in 2004, name after the only Venezuelan baseball player to date that has been enshrined into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. The award is given annually to honor the best Venezuelan-born player following each season.

CURRENT STARS ...

The Atlanta Braves currently have three Venezuelan players on their 40-man roster. The most recognized is former all-star Martin Prado, who has played left field and third base for the Braves this season. As of Wednesday, Prado had played in 60 games this year for Atlanta, slugging four home runs while posting a .318 average. He has also registered seven stolen bases this season.

The Detroit Tigers have the most Venezuelan players on their roster with five. Sixtime all-star Miguel Cabrera leads the way. Cabrera was selected to the National League all-star team in 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007, as well as the AL all-star team in 2010 and 2011. The 29-year-old is widely considered to be one of the best hitters in baseball. His batting average this season now stands at a strong .323, to go along with 13 home runs and 51 RBIs. He has hit at least 30 home runs in seven of his previous eight seasons while batting .320. He has been an MVP-caliber

player since he debuted at 20-years old, receiving MVP votes in all nine of his Major League seasons. He has finished in the top five of the MVP voting the last three years.

Former Major League Baseball player Alfredo (Al) Jose Pedrique didn't have a tremendous career as a player, but has gone on to find success as a manager. Since his retirement, he has managed in the Diamondbacks, Astros and Royals organizations. He was most recently the Houston Astros' bench coach.

There would be more Venezuelan players in Major League Baseball if not for the country's current crime situation. The high crime rates are common in most parts of Venezuela, and the country has been struggling with a decade-high in homicides. There have been about 118,541 civilian deaths since President Hugo Chávez took office in 1999, according to the Venezuelan Violence Observatory, a group that compiles figures based on police files. It has, on occasion, affected baseball players. In November 2011, Washington Nationals catcher Wilson Ramos was kidnapped in Caracas while playing in a winter league. After two days, he was rescued by police in the mountains of the state Carabobo.

New faces bring optimism to Falcons

A fter a 2011 campaign that saw the Falcons post a 10-6 record and once again return to the playoffs, the team continues to make adjustments in order to get over the figurative hump and make a deeper run next season. Tweaks to the roster were necessary after the Falcons were unceremoniously defeated in the playoffs by the eventual champions, the New York Giants.

Major coaching changes were among the first moves made during this offseason as former offensive coordinator, Mike Mularkey, accepted the head coaching job with the Jacksonville Jaguars. Ironically, the Falcons hired Dirk Koetter, who served as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator since 2007, to replace Mularkey. To go along with a new offensive guru, the Falcons also had to replace defensive coordinator Brian VanGorder, who took the same position with Auburn. The team went with a bigger name to guide the defense as former San Francisco 49ers head

coach Mike Nolan was hired just two days after Koetter's arrival.

IRRESISTIBLE FORCE ...

With plenty of explosive weapons on the offensive side of the ball, head coach Mike Smith and Koetter have been working diligently during OTAs in order to maximize the potential of the offense and quarterback Matt Ryan. Koetter's main focus in his offensive schemes is the use of vertical passing game, which, with Pro Bowl-level receivers in Roddy White and Julio Jones, should improve Ryan's ability to get these playmakers the ball more consistently.

White has remained one of the league's best receivers, while Jones looks to improve on his impressive rookie season, when he led all rookies with eight touchdowns. Jones also shared 54 receptions and 959 yards, second among rookies in both categories to the Ben-

gals' A.J. Green. Although Koetter brings a new voice to go along with his offensive sets, major changes to the already potent offense will not be necessary.

"They've adjusted their schemes and terminology to what we were doing and fitting in," center Todd McClure said. "It's been an easy adjustment for us."

IMMOVEABLE OBJECT ...

On the defensive side of the ball, it was clear that after last season's tough end that improvements would be needed. In particular, the secondary, which struggled to stop some of the game's top wide outs, needed work. For just a seventh-round draft pick, the Falcons were able to upgrade the secondary by trading for four-time Pro Bowl cornerback Asante Samuel. Samuel brings a winning attitude to the team as he is a two-time Super Bowl champion with the Patriots and, since 2006, Samuel has led the NFL with 38 interceptions.

Acquiring Samuel from Philadelphia to go along with cornerbacks Dunta Robinson and Brent Grimes adds significant depth to the secondary and allows the Falcons flexibility to formulate defensive schemes that cater to each player's strengths. Samuel recently stated where he wants to be positioned as he looks to become a prominent figure in Mike Nolan's system.

"I want to be on the left-side [of the ball]," Samuel told the Atlanta Journal Constitution. "This is a right-handed league and I want to be where the ball is coming."

With a desire to play mostly where the ball is, the team will expect Samuel to sustain his Pro Bowl-caliber play as the Falcons look to improve on their ability to shut down the league's elite passing offenses.

DRAFT-DAY STARS ...

In April's draft, the Falcons were without a first-round pick due to the draft-day trade last season to acquire Julio Jones. The team used all six of its picks to address other key needs. In Round 2, they selected center Peter Konz, out of Wisconsin, in order to provide offensive line stability and as a future replacement to veteran center McClure. Many believe the 14-year veteran is in the twilight of a solid Falcons career. In Round 3, another offensive lineman was taken as offensive tackle Lamar Holmes out of Southern Miss became the Falcons' pick.

Holmes' impressive physique, at 6-foot-

6, 333 pounds, adds depth to the line and increased quarterback protection of Matt Ryan. After the release of Pro Bowler Ovie Mughelli, the role of fifth-round selection Bradie Ewing, a fullback out of Wisconsin, will likely be significant his rookie season. Ewing will be battling former Georgia Tech star Mike Cox for the starting fullback spot. Also in the fifth round, the Falcons began addressing defense, taking defensive end Jonathan Massaquoi out of Troy. The team hopes that Massaquoi will become an effective pass-rusher as he will learn under the tutelage of veteran defensive ends John Abraham and Ray Edwards. Round 6 saw the Falcons add depth at safety, with Charles Mitchell out of Mississippi State. Mitchell started three seasons for the Bulldogs. The team's final selection was another SECproduct as defensive tackle Travian Robertson was taken in the seventh round.

For the Falcons to return to the postseason for the third-straight season, they will face a brutal slate of games against some of the league's best. There are few, if any, games that the Falcons can consider easier than others. The team will battle against AFC West foes early, traveling to Kansas City to start the season, welcoming Peyton Manning and the Denver Broncos at the Georgia Dome for Monday Night Football in Week 2, then heading out west for a date with the Chargers in Week 3. As if that isn't tough enough, the schedule also includes the NFC East, which will see the Falcons travel to Washington and Philadelphia to go along with home games against Dallas on Monday Night Football and the aforementioned Giants. The usual tough home-and-home divisional matchups against the Saints, Panthers, and Buccaneers are also on the schedule, and the team will also have to travel to Detroit to take on the explosive Lions, whom they knocked off at Ford Field last season.

With fresh faces and new voices guiding the team, there is reason for optimism in Atlanta once again. With Ryan under center, Michael Turner in the backfield and a receiving core of White, Jones and veteran tight end Tony Gonzalez, the offense should remain as explosive as ever. The acquisition of Samuel should spark the overall attitude of the defense as the team looks to shake off two straight disappointing finishes to the season.

Losing Smoove



Area's best QBs and WRs visit Raider Valley

The 9th Annual Atlanta Quarterbacks and Receivers Camp welcomed prospects from across the Southeast to Walton's Raider Valley for three intense days of training. The camp was founded by Walton offensive coordinator Tripp Allen.

This year's group consisted of about 160 players from schools such as East Paulding, Harrison, Lassiter, Lumpkin County, Pope, St. Pius X, Tucker, Walton and the state of Florida. The camp is unique in that the quarterbacks and receivers perform as many reps as they can, while being matched up with a player from another school. For example, a St. Pius X quarterback will throw to an East Paulding receiver.

On Day 1 the players looked sharp, and it was clear that teams have already been busy this offseason with drills and 7-on-7 tourna-

ments. The quarterbacks were hitting their targets and the receivers were catching the ball. Walton star running back Tyren Jones was the most impressive athlete on Day 1 after showing up for the camp with 20 pounds of additional muscle from the 2011 season.

Leading the quarterbacks on the first day was Parker McLeod, who had just committed to Alabama hours before the camp kicked off. In fact, the biggest story of the first day was the Alabama sweep of McLeod and Jones as both are coming off tremendous junior seasons.

GOLDEN PERFORMANCE ...

St. Pius X brought all their quarterbacks, tight ends and receivers once again to the camp. Junior safety Nick Glass took advantage of a rare opportunity to jump over to the

offensive side of the ball after achieving so much success last year on defense. The Golden Lions' defense held eight teams to less than six points and recorded five shutouts over the course of the 2011 season. While Geno Smith was the leader of the defense, Glass also made an impact, and colleges took notice of the sophomore. The 6-foot-2, 205-pound Glass already stands as one of the state's top recruits for 2014. The four-star safety has committed to the University of Georgia.

St. Pius X quarterback Jack Spear was impressive all three days of the camp. One might not expect a team known for running the triple option to look so good passing the ball, but Spear stood out as perhaps the best quarterback other than McLeod. Nick Ruffin certainly stepped up to help his quarterback with an outstanding Day 3. Ruffin, who played running back in the option last season, will make the move to wide receiver as the Golden Lions expand their playbook. Michael Sikorski will also play receiver for the Golden Eagles next season and made some of

the tougher catches all of camp.

When a brief one-on-one route running session broke out towards the end of Day 3, it was Ruffin that accepted every challenge and jumped to the front of the line. One interesting challenge came when teammates squared off as Ruffin faced Glass.

The Atlanta Quarterbacks and Wide Receivers Camp was a success with countless prospects picking up valuable tips and tricks from coaches and instructors helping out over the three days. The camp was an opportunity not just for quarterbacks and receivers to get on the same page as the 2012 high school football season quickly approaches, but also for athletes such as Jones and Glass to jump out to receiver and expand their overall skill set. Jones displayed excellent route-running abilities which could help him once he arrives in Tuscaloosa. Glass also showed that Mark Richt could be getting a potential two-way star in Athens on National Signing Day 2014.

Catching up with a champion

McEachern won the girls Class AAAAA basketball crown this past season in part based on the efforts of the six Lady Indians who have signed with or committed to college programs. Head coach Phyllis Arthur had four seniors in her starting lineup to begin the year that had signed with college programs, and she admitted that it will be difficult to replace those seniors who have now graduated.

"We lost three of our top players from last year to graduation," said Arthur, who was in between games at a summer tournament at Osborne.

One of those players was Pachiyaanna Roberts, who earlier this week was named a Parade All-American. She will play college basketball at Syracuse next season. "It will take two or three players to replace Pachis and everything she did," said Arthur. "You can't just replace a Parade All-American."

Another senior that has moved on is Destinie Gibbs, though she will head to Los Angeles to play at Southern California after originally signing with Ole Miss. Gibbs was released from her scholarship after the Ole Miss head coach that recruited her left the program in Oxford. The McEachern coach said Gibbs, a 5-foot-11 guard, fell in love with USC on a trip to L.A. in early May.

"The whole place is for her," said Arthur. "Los Angeles, California, the school, the program, she just fell in love with it all."

USC also promised that Gibbs will be com-

peting for playing time once she steps on campus.

"They told her she'd play right away because they like her size," revealed Arthur. "They are looking at her for a lot of playing time early. She has a chance to start at a beautiful school."

The McEachern program also lost Dominique Wilson and Kayla Montgomery to Arkansas and Clemson, respectively. Arthur's cupboard isn't bare, however, as she has rising senior Mia Cooper (South Carolina) and rising sophomore Te'a Cooper (North Carolina) returning to help defend the GHSA title.

"Thank goodness the Cooper sisters are back," gushed Arthur. McEachern also has a very talented freshman entering the program in Jayla Lewis as well as some returning seniors.

As most power programs in Georgia do, McEachern will face something of a national schedule in 2012-13 as the team will travel to face Norcross, as well as, to Washington D.C. to play in a national tournament. The team has also been invited to the Nike Tournament of Champions in Arizona.

Langley will lead Longhorns in 2012

The Kell Longhorns finished 2011 with a 9-3 record after falling in the second round of the playoffs to Lovejoy. The Longhorns look like a potential contender for a state title in 2012, but they will first concentrate on winning a region title.

The Longhorns should like their chances to win a region crown in 2012. Out of the 11 teams in the Region 7-AAAA, Pope was the only other team that had a winning record (10-2) in 2011. Kell has owned this east Cobb rivalry, winning the last seven against the Greyhounds.

The Longhorns start their 2012 season in the Georgia Dome with an early and unusual 9 a.m. kickoff time against the Chattahoochee Cougars in the Corky Kell Classic. For the third straight season, the Longhorns are kicking off their season in the Dome before noon. Chattahoochee, winners of the 2010 Class AAAA state title, was also knocked out in the second round of last year's state playoffs. This will be Chattahoochee's first time playing in the Corky Kell Classic.

"I think that it will definitely help us," said Kell wide receivers coach Jonathan Gordon. "Our kids are going to be used to the routine of an early game and staying in a hotel because of our game last year, where (the Cougars) are going to have to adjust for the first time."

Before the Longhorns meet Chatta-

Kell will rely heavily on the playmaking ability of Brandon Langley this season in all three phases of the game.

"He played both sides of the ball for us last year, and he is that rare type that can play all 48 minutes of the game too," said Gordon.

Langley's college decision has been put on hold, although the four-star recruit is certain he will be going somewhere in the SEC next year. Alabama and Georgia have been rumored to be Langley's top two choices as of now. Georgia is telling Langley that the Bulldog coaches would enjoy using him on both sides of the ball like they did with Brandon Boykin. The Tide, however, want to exploit Langley's skills at defensive back.

Broncos seek winning formula

If you ask people for the characteristics of a successful football program, you might get answers such as good athletes, team chemistry, a strategic game plan and an experienced coaching staff. Brookwood football coach Mark Crews says the winning formula is a team with leadership and character. Crews has the results to back his philosophy up: in his nine years with the Brookwood football program he's made the state playoffs all nine seasons, accumulated an overall record of 97-29 and won a state championship title.

Some key returners played on the 2010 state championship team and know what it takes to get to a state championship. Senior offensive lineman Adam Ledford started on the 2010 championship team and will continue to pave the way upfront. Ledford will look to cre-

ate running lanes for the two-headed attack of running backs Jamaal Cole and Josh Brown.

The Brookwood offense will also get some help at the receiver position this season from Orlando-area transfer Kyrin Priester. The UGA commit is a 6-foot-2, 185-pound senior receiver known for his athleticism.

"It's always a plus when you've got a strong running game and a big-play threat on the outside," Crews said. "It puts pressure on the defense by spreading the field and will add some firepower to our offense."

On the defensive side of the ball, defensive end/linebacker Shaun McGee will look to disrupt opposing offenses with his athleticism and ability to create pressure on the quarterback. The 6-foot-3, 236-pound senior is collecting interest from FBS schools, including offers from Alabama, Michigan State, Louisville and Kentucky.

Dream suffering through June

The Dream have yet to hit their stride so far this season and have struggled to a 3-5 mark through the first eight games. Atlanta has lost four of five games this month and was blown out by Connecticut last Sunday 92-73. An 11-0 Connecticut run to start the fourth quarter buried the Dream's chances for a road victory. Atlanta made a run in the final minutes, but it was too little, too late.

"I thought we did a great job of cutting it to six, and then we threw the ball away twice," head coach Marynell Meadors told the AP. "They came back and scored, and when that happened, it took a little excitement out of it and deflated us a bit."

Fourth quarters have been deflating to Dream fans lately and finishing games has been an issue for Atlanta. Chicago hit a buzzer-beating three to tie the game before beating

the Dream in overtime 94-92 on June 2. The New York Liberty outscored Atlanta in the fourth quarter 18-12 to complete a comeback 79-74 win on June 5.

Against Connecticut, the Dream again put up just 12 points in the final quarter. The Dream have to be better in crunch time if they want to get above .500. The goal at this point of the season should be to get to a winning record before battling to get back in the Eastern Conference race.

MCCOUGHTRY ON FIRE ...

The Dream will be in good shape if they continue to get the ball into the hands of their best player, Angel McCoughtry. The third-year forward has been the Dream's best player in every game this season. McCoughtry has one of the best overall games in the league,

averaging 21.6 points, 5.6 rebounds, 3.8 steals and just over a block per game.

McCoughtry's presence down low on both ends of the court make her a threat to get easy baskets and timely boards. Outside shooting is not one of the strongest points of her game, but against New York, McCoughtry was able to knock down two shots from beyond the arc. Atlanta will be successful if McCoughtry scores points inside the paint and on the break. Spreading the ball around to take the focus off their superstar will not get the job done for the Dream and has not so far this season.

POINT GUARD PLAY ...

The play of point guard Lindsey Harding is very important to Atlanta's overall game. In the three wins, the point guard has averaged 14.3 points and 4.3 rebounds. In the five losses, Harding has averaged just 12 points per game. The stat that matters for a point guard has been lacking in nearly every game this season. The most glaring number for Harding was zero assists in a 78-62 loss to Indiana.

However, numbers are not the only indicator of how a point guard is leading a team. In the 60-57 win over San Antonio, Harding was able to distribute the ball and get fast breaks off turnovers down the stretch. The

team has struggled to close out games, but the turnovers at the end of the fourth quarter helped get the Dream the win.

"Even at the end of the game, our strongest suit is to run and get them on their heels," Harding told the AP. "We did that in the second half, which led us to being successful."

When Harding starts to put big numbers up, as expected, the Dream should see big results.

ON THE DOCKET ...

The Dream will have two chances to get a win in front of the home crowd at Philips Arena, tonight against the Los Angeles Sparks and Sunday against the Connecticut Sun. L.A. and Connecticut are playing some of the best basketball in the league and have a combined 12-1 record this season. The Sparks are led by forward Candace Parker, who averages nearly a double-double with 18.9 points and 9.1 rebounds per game. The McCoughtry-Parker matchup should be something to watch in this game. The Sun have four players that average double figures, including Tina Charles' 20.9 ppg. Charles scored 22 points and added 11 rebounds in the last game against the Dream. McCoughtry will be counted on again to stop Connecticut's best player.

"I'm excited that I'm actually going. It's a little bit of a shock," Chetcuti said of his expectations for the Olympics. "I'm not really sure my goals for London, I definitely want to go a sub-50 seconds for the 100 free and try to get top 30, I would be happy with."

Tech is no stranger to sending swimmers to Olympic competition. Four Yellow Jackets competed in the Olympic games in 2004 for various countries. Vesna Stojanovska represented Macedonia in 2004 while Gail Nova suited up Israel in Beijing. Onar Usa saw two tours of Olympic duty (2004, 2008) for Turkey.



Melo is not a scoring threat, but with Zaza Pachulia and Al Horford already on the roster, Melo's proficiency at blocking shots and collecting rebounds would be a welcome addition, giving the Hawks one of the deepest center rotations in the league. Melo would also provide head coach Larry Drew with flexibility in how he can rest his big men. The defensive presence of Melo would allow Drew to alternate rest for Horford and Josh Smith, currently the Hawks best post scorers.

Washington guard Tony Wroten would also be a solid pick up for the Hawks in the late first round if Melo is off the board. Wroten is a dynamic scorer from the guard spot. With questions surrounding whether free agent Kirk Hinrich will be brought back, the Hawks need to find a young backup to Jeff Teague and Joe Johnson. Wroten averaged 16 points per game in his lone season with the Huskies, and at 6-foot-5, has the prototypical size to slide into the "combo-guard" role off the bench in the NBA.

Iona guard Scott Machado is a player the Hawks are very high on because he is a true point guard that would give them a pass-first option off the bench when Teague needs a breather. Machado does not have the flash or name recognition of some of the others that were invited to pre-draft workouts, but don't be surprised to hear Machado's name called for the Hawks on June 28.

MINICAMP PRIMER ...

So what should fans expect to see on the field next week? Probably not head coach Mike Smith or his new coordinators (Mike Nolan on defense and Dirk Koetter on offense) revealing too much about any changes in philosophy. That said, Smith and general manager Thomas Dimitroff emphasize the benefits of "self-scouting," so there should be some glimpses into upcoming "tweaks."

Speaking to the media last week, the tight-lipped Smith did give this tidbit away about the offense.

"We obviously changed some things from last year," said Smith. "Probably more will be

the same then changed, but I like the subtle changes we've seen. I like the competition we've seen along the offensive line. ... Competition is a very good thing."

Since Smith won't reveal much, here's the skinny. The Falcons offense will likely try to improve in three areas. First, there will be an emphasis on generating more push from the offensive line in short yardage situations. Although running back Michael Turner gained 1,340 yards on the ground in 2011, the hierarchy wants to become more efficient when the team only needs a few precious yards.

chy wants to become more efficient when the team only needs a few precious yards.

Second, fans can expect quarterback Matt Ryan to make more downfield throws in the passing game. Improved line play and a healthy Julio Jones in his sophomore professional season should help. Also, expect the Falcons to implement a more effective screen passing game. Another second-year player, running back Jacquizz Rodgers, and slot receiver Harry Douglas should reap the rewards of this initiative.

Rodgers, who was an effective pass catcher out of the backfield at Oregon State, was more upfront than Smith last week.

"Coach Dirk is a big man who is huge on running the screens, so we have a lot of screens in store."


his emergence as Atlanta's starting shortstop to start the 2012 season.

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
