Indians, Trojans strong at skill positions

Going by wins and losses, the top two Class AAAAAA programs in Cobb County since 2009 have been Lassiter and McEachern. While the Indians have been on the warpath under coach Kyle Hockman in winning 38 of 46 games during that span, the Trojans have posted 37 wins over that same 4-year period.

So it only made sense when the Battle of the Big Chicken pitted the two cross-county foes together for the night-cap of the event.

McEachern, ranked No. 3 in the state, is coming off a rousing 31-10 drubbing of perennial-power Brookwood at the Metro PCS Corky Kell Classic in the Georgia Dome. Despite the big win, the Indians were a bit preoccupied with recovering with less than six days rest before tonight. Their game, which kicked off Saturday night, actually ended on Sunday. But Hockman was encouraged by the fact that his team already got their first game out of the way while their opponent has yet to play

way while their opponent has yet to play. "Lassiter hasn't played a game yet," said Hockman. "So we'll be a little tired and banged up, but they haven't played and will have their first-game jitters. So I think it will offset."

Hockman's tribe battered and bloodied their adversaries last week with a series of blows from skill position players on offense and a big and fast front seven on defense. Brookwood entered with a reputation of "ground and pound" football, but McEachern left knowing it can run the ball and stop the run. Running back Taj Griffin and quarterback Ty Clemons combined to rush for 263 yards while the team as a whole produced 323 yards rushing. Meanwhile, defensive ends Henry Famurewa and McKenzie Billingslea led a strong Indians defense that held Brookwood to a paltry 70 rushing yards.

wood to a paltry 70 rushing yards. Lassiter, meanwhile, likes to throw the ball often out of its spread offense. After quarterback Eddie Printz graduated and left for the University of Missouri, the Trojans were in need of a signal-caller with experience. On the other side of the coin, former Wesleyan starter Will Anderson was looking for exposure to college scouts to fulfill his dream of earning a scholarship to a big-time football program.

So the Anderson family moved to east Cobb and Will enrolled at Lassiter. In two years at Wesleyan, Anderson set school records in career passing yards (4,260), completions (341) and passing touchdowns in a game (6). He competed with Russ Aarons, Lassiter's JV starter last year.

"Russ has done a great job for us," said Lassiter coach Jep Irwin. "The JV team went 6-1 last year. He got to play a little bit last year as a sophomore and he's certainly got experience in the system. Will has some starting experience at Wesleyan for two years, and is a senior."

Despite being from the same county, the two power programs have met just one time on the gridiron, a 20-17 Lassiter win in the second round of the 2011 playoffs. While McEachern is one of the favorites to win the state title this year, Lassiter could earn a lot of respect by upsetting the Indians on their home field.

First-ever game between Hawks, Raiders

When the Hillgrove Hawks and Walton Raiders meet in the Battle of the Big Chicken, they'll be making history in the second annual showcase. It is surprising that these two perennial winners have never faced each other despite being just 13 miles and a couple turns off Roswell Road from each other.

With each school's rich playoff history, you could easily have expected the teams to have met in the postseason. Hillgrove began playing football in 2006 and has been in the playoffs four of the last five years. Walton has been in the playoffs every year but one since 2002 (2009). The Hawks reached the state quarterfinals in 2010. Walton reached the state championship game in 2011.

Hillgrove cruised through its opening

game last week, a 26-6 home victory over Westlake. Quarterbacking the offense is head coach Phillip Ironside's son, Elijah. A back-up while recovering from an injury last year, Elijah operates a spread offense for the Hawks that features a lot of depth at wide receiver. Justin Denton appears to be the playmaker of the group. Denton scored on three passes from Ironside in the first half of the opener. Denton is joined on the outside by Omar Black and Zach Katz.

Running back Richardre Bagley, also recovering from an injury last year, seems set to pace the running game. He was the leading rusher against Westlake with 84 yards.

The Hawks' defense is led by defensive end/linebacker Bradley Chubb, an N.C. State

commit. In the opener, the defense held Westlake scoreless. (The Lions' only score came on a fumble recovery returned for a touchdown).

Walton had a tougher first week. The Raiders fell to Peachtree Ridge 23-17 in the Metro PCS Corky Kell Classic at the Georgia Dome. Head coach Rocky Hidalgo is turning his offense over to first-year starter Price Wilson. (Wilson did fill in as a starter in four games last year, winning three). In the Raiders' opener Wilson threw for two touchdowns in the first quarter against the Lions, one each to Maurice Gibson and Jordan McCray. Wilson, a Louisiana Tech commitment, is working behind a talented, but young, offensive line. Sophomore K.K. Brooks looks to be a workhorse in the backfield. The first-time varsity starter led the Raiders with 120 yards on 22 carries at the Dome.

On defense, Walton also possesses a combination of youth and talent. The strength of the team may be the safeties. D.J. Smith returns as a starter and is joined by converted cornerback Taquar Stewart. The Raiders' linebacking corps flashes some speed with the Williams boys, Dreyon and Zach, both seniors who are of no relation.

Even though the teams will be meeting for the first-time, there is some familiarity between the schools. Hillgrove principal Christian Suttle was a coach, athletic director and vice principal at Walton. Suttle and Hidalgo were assistant coaches together before Hidalgo was named the Raiders' head coach before the 2009 season. Hidalgo recently joked, "Unfortunately he is not playing in the game because if he was, I would probably run the ball right at him. ... but this is an important game against an excellent team and that's [the only thing] that is going to matter when we play."





College recruits dot rosters in talent-filled event

The Battle of the Big Chicken Friday at McEachern features a doubleheader with four teams full of talented prospects. All four programs were in the state playoffs last season in the GHSA's highest classification and each is a regular stop for college recruiters.

In the opening matchup, Hillgrove will play Walton for the first time in school history. The Hawks are paced by head coach Phillip Ironside's son, Elijah, the team's starting quarterback. The younger Ironside started as a sophomore in 2011, but had to sit the majority of last season after a preseason shoulder injury.

Ironside has one of the deepest receiving corps in the state to work with, as four receivers return that scored at least one touchdown in 2012. At running back, Richardre Bagley returns after missing last season with a leg injury. Ironside believes Bagley is the guy who will get this team going.

On defense, 6-foot-2, 225-pound hybrid linebacker Bradley Chubb, an N.C. State commitment, leads the Hawks.

Walton's versatile athlete D.J. Smith makes plays running and catching the ball on offense while also playing safety on defense. Smith has offers from Clemson, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia and Kentucky. Walton quarterback Price Wilson saw extensive action last season after the starter, Parker McLeod, injured his ankle. Wilson committed to Louisiana Tech during the offseason. Defensively, Walton linebacker Dreyon Williams leads one of the fastest units in the state.

McEachern went undefeated last season in Region 4, which has become one of the state's most competitive. Indians head coach Kyle Hockman has senior quarterback Ty Clemons and junior running back Taj Griffin, who are both dynamic playmakers who can spark the offense.


The mobile quarterback and the lightingquick back routinely hit the 250-yard rushing mark as an underclassman last season as a tandem. Griffin, who has posted a 4.35 time in the 40-yard dash, recently impressed the UGA coaching staff by volunteering to run the 40 at Dawg Night. Griffin walked right up to the line and proceeded to post a 4.40 without warming up.

Clemons is being recruited as an athlete, and holds offers from Kentucky, Buffalo, Georgia Southern, Louisville and Massachusetts. Griffin has offers from Georgia, Ohio State, Arkansas, Auburn and Clemson. Defensively, Henry Famurewa is a 6-foot-2, 231-pound defensive end who is committed to Louisville. On the other side of the line, McKenzie Billingslea, a 6-foot-2, 250-pounder, carries offers from Ball State, Kennesaw State and Troy. The pair combined to lead a McEachern defense that shut down run-happy Brookwood last week in the Metro PCS Corky Kell Classic.

Lassiter was Georgia's No. 1-ranked team heading into the postseason in 2012, and has a strong cast of players returning. The challenge will be stopping the Indians' ultrafast offense. Protecting the perimeter for the Trojans is Arkansas commit Chris Murphy. The shutdown corner is one of the best in the state and will get a chance to showcase his complete skill set against the speed of McEachern.

Lassiter's last two quarterbacks have landed in the Southeastern Conference: Hutson Mason (UGA) and Eddie Printz (Missouri). In 2013, the spotlight will be on quarterback Will Anderson, who transferred in after spending his junior year at Wesleyan. Anderson will have running back Lane Jackman and receiver Blake Wilson to continue Lassiter's tradition of explosive play-makers.

Tips on how to avoid heat-related issues

Young athletes have a lot on their mindsstaying in shape, eating right, making it to practice and learning the right plays, just to name a few.

This time of year, however, they need to be aware of something else-heat illness. As the temperature rises in the summer months, the risk of heat illness grows, especially for young athletes practicing and training under the sun.

Heat-related illness is preventable. All it takes is basic knowledge about heat response and hydration in young athletes and how to recognize the early signs of heat injury.

There are three kinds of heat illness that young athletes, parents and coaches need to look out for:

- Dehydration and heat cramps—Thirst, fatigue, dizziness, light-headedness, muscle cramps and loss of energy may be signs of dehydration. The athlete should stop and drink water or a sports drink. Muscle cramps can be stretched and lightly massaged. Resume activity with caution only when all symptoms have cleared.
- Heat exhaustion—Dizziness, rapid pulse, headaches, nausea, vomiting, chills and loss of coordination may be signs of heat exhaustion. The athlete may be sweating profusely or the skin may be dry. Activity should be discontinued and the athlete should be rehydrated. If his level of consciousness does not allow oral hydration, transport him to a medical facility

for intravenous hydration. Core body temperature should be measured. If this is not available, transport him to a medical facility for hydration and monitoring. Heat stroke—Call 911 immediately. Confusion, irrational behavior, drowsiness, nausea, vomiting and a dangerously high temperature (104°F and above) may be signs of heat stroke. This is a life-threatening medical emergency that requires rapid cooling by immersion in an ice bath. Ice bags on the neck and groin may help if a bath is unavailable.

The best thing a young athlete can do to prevent heat illness is to stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids throughout the day. This includes water and sports drinks, like Powerade and Gatorade. High-sugar and carbonated drinks, like energy drinks, can dehydrate athletes faster and should be avoided.


A simple guide to determine how much fluid a young athlete should drink is to divide his weight in half. That number is how many ounces of fluids he should drink. For example, if an athlete weighs 140 pounds, he should drink 70 ounces of fluids each day.

TIPS FOR EXERCISING IN THE HEAT

- Schedule workouts during the cooler times of the day.
- Allow children who are overweight, out of shape or unacclimated time to adjust to the heat.
- Schedule water and rest breaks every 30 minutes during activities. During these breaks, do not just encourage, but require children to drink. This also gives the coach or trainer a chance to monitor the athletes.
- Have shade, ice and a kiddie pool available for emergency treatment and rapid cooling.
- Have a cell phone (with a charged battery) available at all workouts for emergency contact.
- Wear sunscreen with sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15. Apply it 30 minutes before going out in the sun and every 20 to 30 minutes if sweating or swimming.
 Wear hats with brims and light-colored,
- breathable clothing.

The fact that these athletes want to be working hard in the sun shows how dedicated they are to their sport. Let's encourage that dedication by keeping them safe.


Uggla's single to left in the seventh inning allowed him to finish him 2-for-4 with the homer and one RBI in the loss in his last rehab start.
