

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Sports talk radio should stop doing news

Monday's horrible Boston Marathon bombings will send a chill down the spines of Americans who still remember the 9/11 attacks when our country was attacked by foreign terrorists. While information is still coming out on the explosions, people are turning to news outlets wherever they can find them. However, there is one place that probably shouldn't be doing news and that is sports talk radio.

When the news hit Monday afternoon that the finish line of the Boston Marathon had been hit, like many that were able, I watched the news and scoured the web for more information. After several hours of hearing more and more about the story, I got into my car to head home. On my ride home, I, like many

other sports fans, enjoy listening to sports talk radio, but what I heard made me roll my eyes. Both 680 The Fan and 790 The Zone were giving updates on the events and in some cases, going live to sister stations that were airing live press conferences. This may sound harsh, but leave the news to the news stations

Delivering the news is a difficult job and many years of practice goes into properly delivering news, especially a breaking story like this. I was a news director for a pair of radio stations for two years. A reporter cov-ers news differently than he/she covers sports. You have to change mindsets. If you've never attempted to do news and are trying to merely switch your sports talk mode into news mode, it won't work. To hear guys that normally

spout off about the NFL Draft, the Georgia Bulldogs and the Braves try to talk in their serious voices about the bombings just didn't work. With so many different avenues available to get news, why in the world would I tune to a sports talk station to hear those guys try to give me what is going on? I understand ESPN was covering it, but the four-letter net-work did so by airing ABC's coverage and supplementing it with Emmy-winning sportscasters. If I wanted to hear news talk, I would tune to news talk.

Does this mean I want to stick my head in the sand about it? No. When you give the sports updates every 20 minutes, give me a quick hit on the news. But how about sticking to sports? In these crazy times, sometimes need a break from reading and watching and hearing about the bombings. Sometimes I just want to be able to sit in my car during rush hour and just escape.

AH, AUGUSTA ... The eyes of the golf world once again turned to Georgia for last week's event at Augusta National. The Masters' ratings were through the roof, especially when Adam Scott and Angel Cabrera went to a playoff. CBS, ESPN and The Golf Channel's ratings were likely at their highest though Saturday right before CBS began to air third-round coverage as

the Tiger Woods' story began getting airtime. Woods was assessed a two-stroke penalty after a viewer called Masters officials to alert them that Woods received an improper drop.

Before I get into some of the local reaction, which was overblown outrage, how in the world does golf let this happen? A viewer saw Woods' drop and called in to complain about it. Seriously? I watch college football with bad calls all the time. Can I call the SEC officials? Can I call Bud Selig when an ump blows a call? Come on Golf!

But some of the reaction to Woods receiving a penalty instead of a DQ was un-real. The rule that would have disqualified him was changed several years ago, so those people were wrong. Woods received no spe-cial treatment. And for those folks saying he should have withdrawn? Really? Would you have withdrawn? I doubt it.

I attended Sunday's round and Woods by far had the biggest crowd despite the fact he didn't really have a shot at the green jacket. Draft day predictions for Falcons fans

t's the end of April and this only means one thing for sports fans. The NFL Draft is upon us and there re-

ally hasn't been a time when there has been so much uncertainty about who will be the first pick, how many trades will be made, or which projected first-round pick will be left out in the cold

Many Falcons fans have uncertainty about what their team is going to do on draft day. The Falcons have 11 draft picks including the No. 30 overall pick, two picks during the second day and eight picks on the final day. So who will the Falcons draft? It's hard

to tell because when a team is picking at No. 30, they almost have to take the best player available instead of just a need. The Falcons have done a good job addressing some of the needs this offseason with the signing of run-ning back Steven Jackson, defensive end Osi Umenyiora and linebacker Brian Banks.

However, the Falcons need a couple of cornerbacks to add depth, another offensive tackle, a defensive lineman and a tight end. So general manager Thomas Dimitroff will have his work cut out for him during draft weekend.

But I'm not here to tell you who I think the Falcons should draft. Instead I'm going to tell you two things I know that are going to happen for the Falcons during draft weekend.

The first thing is that the Falcons will look for players that were leaders on and off the field. Since 2008 when Dimtroff and coach Mike Smith took over the franchise, 33 of the 38 draft picks were college seniors.

And of those 33 players, 17 of them were vot-ed team captains including Matt Ryan, Sam Baker and Thomas DeCoud.

The second thing is the Falcons will make a trade during the three days of the draft. Every year since 2008, Dimitroff has made a draft day trade and it won't end this year. There is no way 11 draft picks will make the team and if Dimitroff sees a player he likes and is available, you better believe he will trade some picks to move up or down depending on the situation.

It will be an interesting draft for the Falcons but at the same time based on Dmitroff's recent track record, it should be a successful draft as well.

BLAZING BRAVES ...

Speaking of successful, the Braves are playing pretty good baseball as of late. Many experts thought that with the lineup the Braves would field every day, they would have a chance to win the NL East. But nobody thought they would win 12 of their first 13 games of the season.

The reason the Braves are hot is they are scoring runs with the long ball. Justin Upton leads all major leaguers with eight home runs and the team has hit 20 which is second best in the National League.

But the pitching, which has been the cor-nerstone for the franchise the last 20 years,

has really separated the Braves from every-one else. The team ERA is a shade under two, which is the best in the Major Leagues.

Paul Maholm has led the way with a 0.00 ERA and three wins. Tim Hudson, Kris Medlen and Mike Minor have also pitched well and the bullpen led by Eric O'Flaherty and Craig Kimbrel has been unhittable. I know it's early in the season and this hot streak will come to an end, but the Braves are sending a message to rest of the league and it looks like they have put the recent postseason disappointments behind them.

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Championship golf returns to Sugarloaf

Following a beautiful week at the Masters, several accomplished golfers are heading up the road to Duluth to compete on the Champions Tour. In the inaugural Greater Gwinnett Championship, past major tournament winners, senior PGA tour golfers and others will compete over 54 holes. Teeing of Friday, the TPC Sugarloaf will be covered in legends throughout the weekend with the likes of, Ben Crenshaw, Bernhard Langer, Tom Watson and many others.

THE SETTING ...

TPC Sugarloaf is best known for hosting the AT&T Classic before it was cancelled in 2008. The AT&T Classic was always held the week before the Masters to give players a tournament to warm-up under the Georgia pines. This new event will be a part of the Champiions Tour through the 2016 season to see how it performs and, if it passes the test, it could become a new tradition on the tour.

If you see players getting misty eyed on the course, it's from all of the fond memories they had playing here during their years on the PGA Tour. TPC Sugarloaf gave Duffy Waldorf fits through the years, but he still returns as a course record holder with a low round of 63, a mark also held by Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson and Ben Crane. Others return to try and grab that elusive win after finishing runner-up to some of the other great golfers.

Kenny Perry is looking forward to going back even if it brings back memories of what could have been. In a playoff with Ryuji Imada in the 2008 AT&T Classic, Perry was looking to find the green while avoiding the lake on the front side. He found the only tree on the hole and his ball ricocheted across the green and into the lake anyway. He would finish second that year, his best finish at the course.

There are 81 professionals who will be competing for the first victory in the inaugural tournament. There will be no cut in place, so it will be an exciting Sunday following the turn. While it's still early in the season, there are many golfers looking to take the lead in the Charles Schwab Cup. Langer comes into the weekend atop the standings, and he will look to maintain the momentum from his Masters performance to keep him there.

There will also be a rookie looking to

move up the board in the Champions Cup. Rocco Mediate will be looking for his second victory on the senior circuit and looks to be the top challenger to Langer for the top spot in senior golf. Last season's Cup winner, Tom Lehman, is sitting back in 15th place and will be looking to make his presence felt and springboard the rest of his season by having a strong showing in Duluth this weekend.

GIVING BACK ...

While the stop by the Champions Tour will generate lots of revenue for local businesses, it will also generate funding for lots of local charities that need the help. The charities benefitting will be Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, Georgia Gwinnett College Foundation, Gwinnett Children's Shelter, Gwinnett County Public Schools Foundation and Gwinnett Tech Foundation. These are all local organizations that will be able to maintain operations with the money they receive this weekend during the tournament.

The course and area have been garnering praise since the players arrived Monday and some have even gone as far as saying that TPC Sugarloaf is their favorite TPC course to play on tour. It is a course that doesn't favor anyone's particular playing style because it is long, but also has the rolling hills of the north Georgia landscape. It will be interesting to see what types of shots players hit when they don't have the greatest lie on the par fours and fives. While these are still some of the best golfers in the world, they have lost a little length on their game, and reaching the greens in two with be a difficult task for some. The winner will likely be the player who uses his irons to best get him in position to make the shots he needs.

TPC Sugarloaf is a private club so this may be the only chance many patrons have to walk the course. It is known for being a beautiful course to walk, and that is exemplified by what makes golf in Georgia so grand. The hills will present a challenge for some just on the conditioning front since it is such a long hilly course with long walks between the greens and the next tee box.

This reemergence of professional golf back into Gwinnett may cause some to wonder if the PGA Tour is on its way back as well. While a successful tournament could pave the PGA's return, people should just appreciate the legends out on the course playing the game they love at a high level. If the Tour does decide to come back to Duluth, the Gwinnett Sports Commission would welcome them back with open arms.

For now, the Tour members will walk the pine-shaded fairways making the difficult hills look easy and taking the patrons back to younger days when they watched the likes of Watson while he was winning his eight majors. While few believe Watson will be in contention on Sunday, he will still have a large following because of his stature in the history of golf. He will be starting his tournament on the 10th tee and teeing off with Langer and David Frost at 12:30.

The tournament also featured a pro-am portion Wednesday and Thursday that was open to the public. With a new twist, this year's pro-am will allow local businessmen to participate for a fee and play alongside their heroes. This is a weeklong event that will continue to evolve and grow while it remains on the Champions Tour.



Local prospects shine in camp spotlights

A pair of recruiting camps recently took place on the Atlanta area and some of the nation's top recruiting talent took part in at least one of the events. The Rivals.com Camp Series set up shop at Marietta High School to evaluate the region of talent that is considered to be the paramount of high school football. "We have been looking forward to com-ing to Atlanta," said camp director Al Luginbill before the camp. "Everybody knows the SEC is where the best football is played and it is be-cause the best players are coming from here." The camp was invitation only and more than 200 campers, including some of Georgia's biggest names, were in attendance. The states of Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama were all represented. More than 30 rivals.com evaluators had their eyes glued to the five hours of drills to get an up-close look at each player. SEVERAL STANDOLITS

SEVERAL STANDOUTS ... Defensive end Lorenzo Carter out of Norcross is the No. 1 recruit in Georgia and a top 10 prospect in the country and had all the attention early. Carter used his 6-foot-5, 232-pound frame and wide receiver speed to

shine during combat drills, Carter would be lined up with an offensive lineman and would have to try and get to the stationary quarter-back behind them as fast as possible. He was a mismatch each rep and blew by linemen the same way a kick returner would shake a kicker in the open field. Class of 2015 standout Tyler Queen was another guy who showed out at the Rivals camp. The rising junior quarterbacked his North Cobb Warriors to the state semifinals as a sophomore last season while breaking the Cobb County single-season scoring record. Queen has a 6-foot-3, 235-pound frame and an arm that had all the receivers jousting for position in line to get matched up with him in the one-on-one drills. Deep out routes and back-shoulder throws by Queen proved to be impressive as he demonstrated his great funda-mentals and athleticism. Walton quarterback Price Wilson is a ris-ing senior and will get a chance to square off with Queen next season in Raider Valley. The two were competing at the camp and Wilson was making big-time throws. Among the tal-ented quarterbacks at the camp, Wilson was one of the guys that looked like he was in mid-

season form throwing the football. Five-star quarterback Deshaun Watson of defending state champion Gainesville was there as well as Sandy Creek quarterback Cole Garvin. The wideouts that were getting open for these big-name passers were equally impres-sive. Emanuel Beal is a recent transfer from Wheeler to Hillgrove and was unstoppable during drills. Beal's 6-foot-1, 205-pound frame was the most impressive of any of the receiv-ers. He won the one-on-one battles with ease and he appears ready to establish himself on the Hawks' offense when their spring practice begins. begins.

the Hawks offense when then spring practice begins. Cole Cook was one of the big name tight ends present, and the 6-foot-6, 235 pounder from Carrollton showed the scouts how he can mismatch a defense. Cook has offers from Missouri, Mississippi State, N.C. State, Cin-cinnati and Troy. The defensive side of the ball featured Malkom Parrish, who was named the camp's best defensive performer. Parrish took no time to make a statement, and in one-on-one cov-erage drills, he intercepted the first four balls thrown his way. The Brooks County shutdown corner is leaning towards Georgia and Oregon at the next level. He was a unanimous decision among the experts as the top performer on de-fense.

fense. "This might be the most talent we ever have seen at one of these camps," said Lugin-bill as the players left the field.

There is a lot of offseason left with spring practice around the corner. A competitive spring and a summer of 7-on-7's will continue to set the stage for a star studded 2013 season in Georgia.

to set the stage for a star studded 2013 season in Georgia. **MVP HIGHLIGHTS** ... Lee County head coach Dean Fabrizio has a superstar at quarterback in Stephen Collier. Last year as a junior, Collier passed for more than 2,000 yards and ran for another 500 yards. He accounted for 33 touchdowns (27 passing, six rushing) and stands 6-foot-4, 210 pounds and is still growing according to Fabrizio. Luckily for Collier and Fabrizio, the quarter-back will have two of the state's top linemen watching his back this year in rising senior Jesse Freeman and Barnes took part in the MVP Camp in Atlanta and Rusty Mansell was highly complimentary of each tack! Mansell noted in a piece for Dawgs247, Freeman is "the real deal." Fabrizio said he was outstanding early on in the camp and Mansell praised Freeman for his ability to handle de-tensive tackle Chris Williams of Sandy Creek in consecutive reps. 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
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
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
